The Grants Pass public schools will open on Monday, September 9th, with a force of 13 teachers; principal, Prof. F. E. Young; vice principal, Miss Astelia Goodin and the following corps of teachers: Nora Swain, Minnie Tuffs, May Sutton, Mary Day, Allie Pool, Florence Akin, Eva Akin, Dora Colvig, Calla-Heddin, Lillian Hogan, Ednel Hackett.

Following are the tuition rates for non-resident students: For high school, \$7.50 per quarter; for 5th, 7th and 8th grades, \$6.00; other grades, \$5.00.
The school house has been newly calculated and its appearance greatly improved. An innovation introduced this year by the board is Parents' day. One day in every month is appointed on which the parents are especially invited to be present, not only in the forenoon but in the afternoon and all day. No special exercises will be held, but the regular recitations will be held until about the middle of the afternoon, when the pupils will be dismissed leaving their desks and books as they have used them and these will then be subject to inspection.

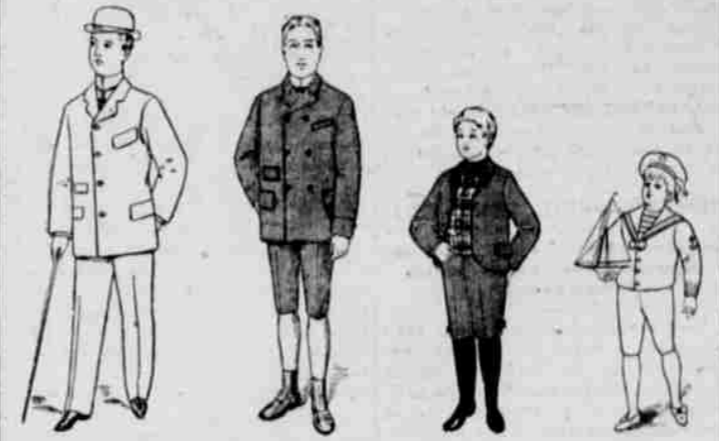
