DOUGLAS COUNTY BAD BOYS.
The grand jury of Douglas county
has found a true bill against one
Harry Granelli for attempt to wreck
a railroad train. Granelli is a young
man about 20 years of age. In com-
pany with one Thomas Arnold, he
scarcely more than a boy, he is
accused of obstructing the Southern
Pacific R. R. track on May the 18th
by placing a cattle guard rail, an
angle bar and a block of wood on the
railway curve known as the Green
bend, at Rice Hill. Section Foreman
L. H. Calame discovered the obstruc-
tion in time to prevent the derail-
ing of any train and immediately notified
the Portland office of the company
who in turn wired the chiefs of po-
lice of the towns along the railway
line. Granelli and Arnold were ar-
rested at Cottage Grove and held to
await the charges. Granelli being
the older of the two was attended to
first, while so far no action has been
taken on Arnold. It appears that the
miscreants had been put off a freight
train at Rice Hill, and in their spite
they placed the obstruction on the
track. Special cag was taken by the
railroad men to see that the track was
kept clear for President Harriman's
special train which came along soon
after, and thus the attempt at train
wrecking was fortunately discovered
before any harm had been accomplish-
ed.

**SOUTHERN OREGON
PRESBYTERY.**
A special meeting of the Presbytery
of Southern Oregon was held in the
Presbyterian church at Ashland last
Thursday afternoon in response to a
call from the moderator. There were
present: Rev. C. W. Hays, of Grants
Pass; Rev. T. F. Day, D. D., and
Elder W. H. Gorn of Medford; Rev. S.
H. Jones, of Jacksonville; Rev. Wm.
Clyde, Phoenix; Rev. F. G. Strang, of
Elder J. P. Gilmore, Ashland.

Rev. F. G. Strang, stated his rea-
sons for his action in asking his peo-
ple to unite with him in requesting
Presbytery to dissolve the pastoral re-
lationship. The voice of duty seemed to
be calling him to go down to Marsh-
field as a home missionary and do
what he had done in Ashland and in
Seattle; he had given himself to the
home missionary work at the begin-
ning of his ministry. He would al-
ways esteem the years of his ministry
in Ashland as the very best of his life;
in all probability his best work had
been done here; no pastor had ever
had a more loyal or faithful church,
and he asked that his request be grant-
ed simply because it seemed to be duty
on his part.—Tidings.

Following totals for the expenses of the five principal offices in the state gov-
ernment are compiled from the Session Laws and reports of the secretary of state.
The showing for each office is intended to be the salary and then the appropriation
or the same office annually. The items for the state printing are now made to
show the total appropriations for four years, a biennial estimate, and then the
expenses of the state for light, heat, water, etc., added:

Proposed Amendment.
Section I of Article IV of the Constitution
of the State of Oregon shall be and
hereby is amended to read as follows:
Section 1. The legislative authority
of the state shall be vested in a leg-
islative assembly, consisting of a senate
and house of representatives, but the people
reserve to themselves power to propose
laws and amendments to the Constitu-
tion, and to enact or reject the same at
the polls, independent of the legislative
assembly, and also reserve power at their
own option to approve or reject at the
polls any act of the legislative assembly.
The first power reserved by the people
is the initiative, and not more than eight
percent of the legal voters shall be re-
quired to propose any measure by such
petition, and every such petition shall
include the full text of the measure so
proposed. Initiative petitions shall be
filed with the secretary of the state not
less than four months before the election
at which they are to be voted upon. The
second power is the referendum, and it
may be ordered (except as to laws neces-
sary for the immediate preservation of
the public peace, health or safety), either
by petition, signed by five percent of
the legal voters, or by the legislative as-
sembly, as other bills are enacted. Ref-
erendum petitions shall be filed with the
secretary of state not more than ninety
days after the final adjournment of the
session of the legislative assembly which
passed the bill on which the referendum
is demanded. The veto power of the
governor shall not extend to measures
referred to the people. All elections on
measures referred to the people of the
state shall be held at the biennial regular
general elections, except when the leg-
islative assembly shall order a special
election. Any measure referred to the
people shall take effect and become the
law when it is approved by a majority
of the votes cast thereon, and not other-
wise. The style of all bills shall be:
"Be it enacted by the people of the State
of Oregon." This section shall not be
construed to deprive any member of the
legislative assembly of the right to intro-
duce any measure. The whole number of
votes cast for justice of the supreme
court at the regular election last preced-
ing the filing of any petition for the in-
itiative or for the referendum shall be the
basis on which the number of legal vot-
ers necessary to sign such petition shall
be counted. Petitions and orders for the
initiative and for the referendum shall
be filed with the secretary of state, and
in submitting the same to the people he
and all other officers shall be guided by
the general laws and the act submitting
this amendment until legislation shall
be especially provided therefor.

1899.
