Southern Oregon Man Invents New Magazine Gun.

E. E. Redfield has invented and constructed a new magazine gun which is a novelty and one of the neatest and best arrangements in line that has ever been made for rifles of small calibre and the one he has made is a 22, with room in the magazine for about a dozen short cartridges of about 10 long. The gun has a pistol grip, with skeleton stock. The shells are loaded near the muzzle end of the magazine and are pressed out of the breech by a spring as in the ordinary magazine gun. One noteworthy feature of this gun is that it will work with any length of 22 calibre cartridges. A repeater to shoot cartridges of various lengths has been known hitherto. The shells of different lengths may be mixed in the magazine at will and each will come up properly in its turn. There is an automatic cut off in the magazine which lets only one shell out at a time. When the shell comes out of the magazine, a little arrangement sizes it exactly as a pair of hands would, grasp a stove pipe and lifts it up to be loaded. The lever has a short stroke and is worked by the middle finger, while the first finger manipulates the trigger, giving a rapidity that is marvellous. The gun is of simple arrangement the lever cocks the gun or leaves the hammer down, at the will of the operator. Practically, the machinery of the lock consists of two parts. The gun is a new departure and its many advantageous features are quickly realized by sportsmen who examine it.

QUIOT PITCHING CONTEST

To Be Held in Grants Pass During Carnival Week.

The people of Grants Pass will have a chance to witness a world's championship contest. F. B. Tichenor, Organizer for the Woodmen of the World, who now holds the world's championship in quoits has been challenged by R. L. Bell of San Francisco, and the contest is to take place some day during the street carnival. Mr. Tichenor has defeated every man he has met since 1896. Mr. Tichenor won the cup in 1896. Mr. Bell has never lost a game in all his contests and has been trying for over two years to pitch a game with Mr. Tichenor and now feels sure that he can win the honor. Mr. Tichenor said in speaking of the coming contest, "I wanted to pitch Mr. Bell last year, but Mr. Harrier was first, and as I only have to pitch one game a year to hold the cup, I do not follow it as a profession. I know Mr. Bell is a hard man to win from, having a long steady arm, still he will have to pitch fingers in order to win." The San Francisco Post has this to say about Mr. Tichenor's last contest: "Mr. Tichenor still holds the world's championship at quoits. Mr. Harrier played a good game but could not overcome Mr. Tichenor's many ringers; it was a good fast game and no kidding. More than two thousand people were present to witness the game. This makes the 74th game Mr. Tichenor has won and has never yet met defeat. The score stood first set, Harrier 10, Tichenor 21; second set, Harrier 20, Tichenor 21; third set, Harrier 18, Tichenor 21. Mr. Bell and Tichenor will use three pound brass quoits, pitching 60 feet. Three sets—21 points to the set.

Shorty-Hop Mine.

Dr. D. S. Sanford, of New York, who arrived here a few days since to inspect the Shorty-Hop mine property of which he is one of the principal stockholders, visited the mine on Wagner creek Thursday. The Shorty-Hop company are planning some important improvements of the property with a view to more extensive development and operations of the mine on a larger scale. It is designed to double the capacity of the ditch which supplies the water power for the stamp mill. The present ditch which takes the water from Wagner creek and is a mile and a quarter in length, is in fairly good condition and the repairs needed are inexpensive, but former experience has shown the need of increasing its capacity largely, which can be done at no great cost, as the ditch line lays mainly upon good ground. The Shorty-Hop property comprises six claims of 200 acres of ground in all, and a mile of the ledge is marked out within the boundary limits.—Ashland Tribune.
