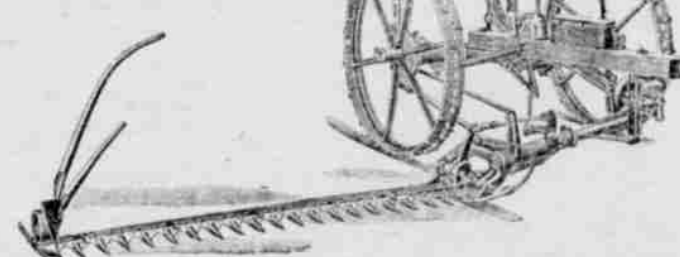

FEATURES OF CARNIVAL

Large Crowds and Lively Times During the Big Show.

The carnival is over and gone. Its sights are vanished and its sounds are hushed. No more the lion's roar singles with the shrill whistle of the merry-go-round and the strident music of Egypt. The carnival is now a memory.

All through the carnival season a large crowd of people was in attendance, visitors from all parts of Southern Oregon, and the town presented a most lively and animated scene. Many of the business houses had attractive booths erected on the Midway, which was a picturesque and crowded street during all the progress of the event.

The balloon ascension occurred on Thursday morning and was one of the best ever witnessed in Southern Oregon. As it had been postponed from the day before, the time for its occurrence was not very generally known and there were many who missed this sight. The ascension went up to a height of perhaps 1500 feet and dropped with the parachute to almost the identical spot from which he started.

Queen Centenna filled her position with a pleasant grace and attractiveness and was a most charming sovereign. On Thursday evening the Woman's club had arranged to give a reception in her honor at the Art exhibit, with a musical program by Signor Boffa and family and Miss Eula Howard. Several hundred people were present, but through some unfortunate misunderstanding the queen was not permitted to attend. On Friday evening, however, the ladies entertained her at the Art exhibit, with a large number of guests present, and a very delightful time was enjoyed. The memories of Miss Rothermal's reign in Grants Pass will always be pleasant.

The baby show was held on Friday afternoon and a number of infantile contestants appeared on the stage in the big pavilion under the care of mothers, grandmothers and sisters, and the diversity of infantile attractions and characteristics was most entertaining. Prizes were awarded as follows:

The Loretta twins, Norine and Pauline, horizontal bar artists, gave wonderful exhibitions of skill in their specialties. These little girls, only seven years of age, perform feats which tax the skill of trained adult gymnasts, and their charming behavior and attractive and bright appearance made them quick favorites with all who saw them.

An exceptionally good ventriloquist entertainment was also given in connection with their exhibition.

The menagerie was not large but it was interesting and well selected. There were two lions, one a large and well behaved beast, while the other is a particularly vicious lioness who has killed a number of men. The keepers aver that they have to watch her continually and that she knows the trick of reaching beneath the bars, seizing a man by his clothing, yanking him up to the bars and clawing his head off before he can express his objections. The 14 months old Bengal tiger kitten is a good natured animal when not ruffled and enjoys being petted by the keepers though they perform this operation respectfully and take no liberties. The two hyenas are ugly and ill natured brutes, while their cousins, the coyotes, are jovial and tractable. The South American tapir is an interesting animal, rarely seen in captivity. The cassowary, a large bird which wears hog like bristles instead of feathers died in its cage on Thursday, quite a severe loss, as the bird was a valuable one. Two animals were added to the menagerie on Saturday: a deer and a little black bear, both natives of Southern Oregon.

The Japanese theatre was among the most popular of the shows. The troupe of jugglers and equilibrista performed the most difficult and marvelous feats with a good humor and accuracy which was peculiarly delightful. In this line of work, the Japanese excel above nearly all other nations and this troupe performed feats that were seemingly impossible.

One of the most interesting of the exhibits was that of the glass blowers where all sorts of beautiful and delicate novelties were made while you wait. The operation of spinning glass into thread was shown and cloth woven of the spun glass, was among the exhibits.

The electric shows, a moving picture exhibition, was a popular attraction. The "trip to the moon," a picture story, is one of the most amusing productions of its class and was a popular favorite.

The Ferris wheel and the merry-go-round worked early and late and were patronized with an enthusiastic liberality. Many of the people experienced the novel sensation incident to riding the camels. An earthquake or an elevator is the only other creature that can produce a sensation equal to that experienced by the rider when the animal rises or kneels.
