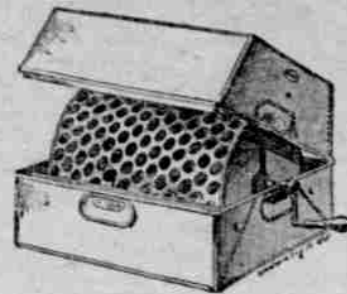

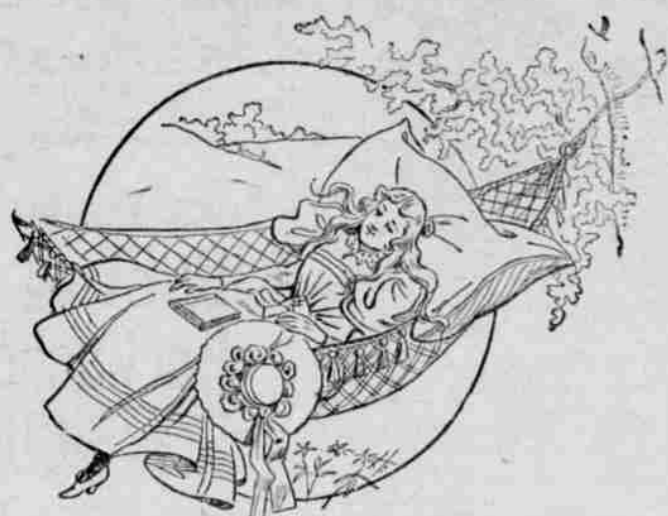

TOOK CARE OF ORCHARD

Horticultural Success of Elmer Wertz of This City.

Elmer Wertz, one of the well known boys of this city, has turned his attention this season to horticultural subjects with a success that might well be emulated by many orchardists of far greater experience than himself.
