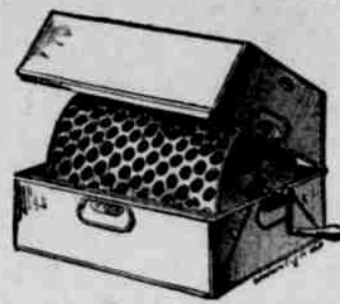

A Seeming Miracle Puzzles Eugene Physicians.

A Eugene dispatch says: Dr. L. W. Brown, of this city, relates a most peculiar circumstance. He was called to Cottage Grove Friday night to assist in an operation to remove an eye from Mrs. Hennicutt, who has been blind in one eye for 35 years, and it had been deemed advisable to remove the useless member.

The operation was to be performed this morning and the woman was placed on the operating table and the attending surgeons got their instruments in readiness for the operation when the woman shouted that the Lord had restored her sight.

Those in attendance were greatly surprised at this outburst, but the good eye was closed and she was shown several articles and could see them plainly with the eye that had been blind for years and called the articles by name. There were half a dozen witnesses of the occurrence and all were dumfounded.

The woman had spent several hours in prayer previous to the time for the operation and just before going on the operating table offered a final prayer to God to restore her sight. She naturally feels that her prayer was answered.

JACKSONVILLE WINS GAME

Grants Pass Defeated With Score of 5 to 4.

The baseball game at Jacksonville Sunday between the Grants Pass and Jacksonville teams was one of the best games played on a Southern Oregon ground this season. It was won by Jacksonville with a score of 5 to 4, 10 innings being required.

The game was marked by very few errors and was close throughout. In the second inning the Grants Pass boys succeeded in making two runs. Neither side scored thereafter until the fifth inning when Jacksonville made a run and repeated the performance in the following inning, tying the score. In the eighth inning, the contestants recorded two runs each and the score was still tied, 4 to 4.

In the ninth, neither scored. In the tenth inning a lucky hit by Joe Donegan of Jacksonville landed the ball near the fence and brought in Orth for the winning run.

PIPE FOR WALDO PLACER. Improvements in Progress at the Simmons Mine.

Two car loads of hydraulic pipe for the Simmons-Cameron placer of Waldo arrived here this week and Manager J. T. Logan came over on Tuesday to arrange for transporting it to the mine. The pipe is in three sizes, 24, 30 and 18 inches in diameter respectively. Last season's work at this well known property was attended with more prosperous results than that of any preceding season for many years, mainly on account of the efficient work of the hydraulic elevator installed by Mr. Logan.

This year he intends to raise the gravel to a height of 34 feet. This mine is one of the biggest placer properties in the state with an annual clean up running into the tens of thousands of dollars.

FOUND DEAD IN CABIN. Fate of J. H. Armpriest, an Old Pioneer.

J. H. Armpriest, an old pioneer of Southern Oregon, was found dead in his cabin a few miles from Gold Beach last week. He had evidently been dead several days when found.

J. H. Armpriest was one of the earlier residents of this part of Oregon, having come to this state in 1848. He has been a resident of Rogue River valley and Curry county since the country was first settled by white men, half a century ago. His wife and two children are dead. Heart failure and old age were the causes of death.

ORE GIVES GOOD RETURNS. Harth & Ryan Make Mill Test of Eighty Tons of Rock.

A mill run of 80 tons of ore from the Harth-Ryan mine near Woodville has just been completed. A little over 100 ounces of gold was the result of the clean up, the value being about \$2000, or an average of \$25 to the ton. The mine has been under development for some time and the owners have a considerable quantity of ore in sight. The mine is located on the south side of Rogue river, nearly opposite Woodville and is one of the most promising properties of its district.

G. W. LEWIS IS DEPUTY. Recent Appointment by Game Warden J. O. Baker.

The Oregon State Game Warden, J. O. Baker, of Cottage Grove, has appointed Geo. W. Lewis, of Wilderville, Josephine county, deputy game warden for Southern Oregon, under the provision of the state game laws, which provide for his pay at the rate of \$2 per day and expenses during the time engaged upon the duties of the office, but the allowance cannot exceed \$50 per year. Riley Hamersley, of Gold Hill, was a prominent aspirant for this appointment.
