### SCHOOL OPENED MONDAY

**Large Enrollment and Rooms Closely Crowded.**

The Grants Pass public schools opened on Monday with by far the largest enrollment of their history for the opening of a term. The teachers have been so busied with their work that the exact number of the enrollment has not yet been computed, but it is probably somewhere in the neighborhood of 850. New scholars to the number of 133, who have never attended school here before, were being received, new comers from 26 or 27 states of the union. The pupils are badly overcrowded and the completion of the new school house is anxiously awaited, that the congestion may be relieved. The board of directors have procured a number of chairs as an adjunct to the seating capacity of the several rooms and an additional teacher, Miss Mae Phipps of Medford, has been employed for the City hall room, where two teachers are compelled to occupy one apartment. The new school building will be completed in about a month. Many who will be pupils have not yet arrived in town and the enrollment will increase rapidly during the next two months. A total force of 17 teachers are employed.

### RUN OVER BY ICE WAGON

**Little Bertie Williams' Astounding Experience.**

Bertie Williams, the six year old son of Mrs. G. D. Williams of this city, was run over by a heavy wagon, loaded with ice, on Thursday, and that he survived the experience and is recovering, seems almost miraculous.

The teams which were hauling ice from the water company's plant at the river to the railroad yards for shipment passed in front of the Williams residence on West Front street and sometimes Bertie would go out and get a piece of ice. This time he was playing in the streets when the wagon came along. The boy has not been able to give a very coherent account of what happened, but he seemed to have climbed on the wagon and his fingers slipping from the ice to have fallen between the wheels. The rear wheel nipped a piece from his knee, tearing loose the knee cap and passed over his body just above the hips. It was a heavy transfer wagon and with its load of ice it seems almost incredible that the boy could be run over on the hard road bed without being cut in two, but the condition of his body clearly showed that such was the case. The driver went on up the street totally unconscious of the accident. Unassisted except for his little dog, the boy managed to get as far as the front gate where he lay down on the ground, unable to proceed farther. He was carried into the house and medical assistance was immediately summoned. His body was found to be terribly cut and bruised and his recovery was at first considered extremely doubtful but at the present time he is improving nicely and is thought to be out of all probable danger.

### APPLEGATE WAGON ROAD

**Construction Not Yet Ordered by Jackson County Court.**

The Jackson county court, at its session last week, did not let a contract for the construction of the proposed road up the east bank of Applegate, for the reason that the court did not consider any of those submitted reasonable. One of the bids submitted was for 8 1/2 miles of road for \$6,000. At this rate the entire road proposed to be constructed would cost some \$15,000. The court will receive bids again at the October meeting.
