It is so difficult to measure and direct our efforts as to appease all the demands of our triplicate natures that the simpler way is to regard happiness as a by-product, give over all direct attempts to acquire a constant supply of it and simply accept however much of it may come while we go about our business with such intelligence as we can. We can usually keep our bodies in fair repair if we are not too lazy or too self-indulgent; if we have to earn our living, our minds, and bodies too, find occupation that is usually wholesome; and the discipline of work does, as it usually is, for others as well as for ourselves, help to satisfy the exactions of the spirit.—Harper's Weekly.

AGAIN IN TOILS OF THE LAW

Forger Burke is Recaptured in State of Washington.

J. H. Burke, the desperate escaped prisoner from the Washington county jail at Hillsboro, whose crimes include the forging of the name of a well known Jackson county citizen to a note for \$100, has again been captured and safely secured, this time by Sheriff Beisecker, who Saturday night shot Burke twice and captured him at his brother's cabin, six miles from Vancouver, Wash. Early on the morning of September 9, Burke and J. T. McNamara dug through the wall of the Hillsboro county jail and escaped. McNamara was recaptured a few days later at The Dalles. On September 20, Burke was captured by Sheriff Totten, at Carson, Wash., but escaped. On September 21, he was arrested by Frank Shrook, near Lower Cascades, whom he overpowered and robbed of a rifle and two revolvers and escaped. Burke operated extensively in Oregon and California in bogus paper and his speculations included the cashing at the Medford bank of a \$100 note which he procured to Cashier Bryant with the name of E. K. Anderson, of Talent, upon it, the signature to note proving to be a bold forgery.

HOLD-UP ON THE O. R. & N.

Nerv Messenger Shoots Robber and Balks the Project

Four masked men leaped up the O. R. & N. overland train, which left Portland at 8:15 Wednesday night, at the 21-mile post, east of Troutdale. Their attempt to loot the express car was frustrated by the shooting of one of their number by Express Messenger Fred Kroner, which had the effect of scaring the other three bandits away. The shooting of the robber unfortunately carried with it the wounding of Engineer Barrett. Two of the masked men climbed over the tender and ordered Engineer Barrett and Fireman Stevenson to accompany them to the first car behind, which the robbers mistook for the express car. On the ground they were joined by two more armed men. After blowing out the door of the first car and discovering that it contained only baggage, the men started toward the second car, which was the one they were bent on looting. At this juncture, Messenger Kroner, armed with a shot gun, appeared at the front door of his car. He discharged the weapon at one of the bandits and as the victim tumbled to the ground, his companions took to their heels. Some of the stray shot struck Engineer Olla Barrett, but he was not seriously wounded.
