Another Pioneer Gone. Chauncey Nye, Member of First Oregon Legislature, Dies.

Once more has the grim reaper swung his scythe and another pioneer figure has joined the ranks of those who have gone on before. Sunday, January 25th, marked the passing of Chauncey Nye, one of the sturdy quail, who helped to build up a community of happy homes and prosperous cities from the wilderness which was Southern Oregon once.

Mr. Nye was born in Macomb county, Michigan, on May 20, 1827, and then finally settled, and spent his whole life on the frontier.

He was one of the first representatives in the lower house of the Oregon legislature from Jackson county. He served in the fifth regular session of the territorial legislature from December 4, 1850, to February 2, 1854, from this county along with John F. Miller and Geo. H. Ambrose.
