### A PROFUSION OF ROSES

#### Grants Pass Rose Gardens Have Abundance of Flowers

"Such roses cost \$1.50 per dozen where I came from." Such was the remark of a Minneapolis man as he admired a bouquet of some of our roses last week. Not only was he well inside the truth, but in many places such roses as Grants Pass gardens are now showing, are not to be found even in hot houses.  
The past season has been very favorable for roses, and the blossoms never were finer. It is a constant marvel to eastern people to have we can raise such beautiful roses outdoors. The secret is in our mild winter and the large amount of spring sunshine.  
Anybody can have roses in profusion in Grants Pass with very little trouble. They are easily propagated from cuttings, and on account of our long season, make as much growth in one year as the ordinary rose which is sold for a two year old. There is hardly a catalogued variety which will not give good results with us. This spring all of the gardens which have "Beauty of Glazewood" bushes are a mass of salmon and orange color, the blossoms almost hiding the leaf. Marechal Niel was also at its best and one, two-year-old bush set out last spring produced at least 50 large perfect flowers. A walk along our residential streets will show a profusion of bloom, not often seen, and such varieties as the La France family, Bride, Duchess de Brabant, Paul Neyron, Etrole de Lyon, Catherine Mermel, Gloire de Dyon, Marie Henriette, Gen'l Jacqueminot, will be seen in all their glory. Paul Neyron often attains a size of seven inches across, and is a constant bloomer.  
Roses begin to bloom about May 1, and last till December 1, although it is not an exception to pick pretty buds in December. It is difficult to say whether the spring or fall roses are the finest, as the latter blossoms have a beauty of fragrance and coloring peculiarly their own.  
Oregon is a rose state, but we doubt if any part of it can show finer roses than those which may now be enjoyed by everyone.
