The City Attorney was instructed to draw an ordinance making the city election laws conform to state election laws.  
The saloon bond of C. E. Smith was approved and license ordered.  
Marcus Robbins was granted permission to place a sign on the corner of Sixth and H streets in front of bank.  
Offer of J. D. Stevens to sell backlot for \$4.00 was accepted.  
The matter of the Salvation Army exchanging the lot formerly purchased by them for the lot where their building now stands was approved and exchange ordered made.  
M. S. Anderson was granted permission to remove her building from its present location on Front street.  
The city engineer reported profile and specifications for Seventh street sewer. The sewer committee reported to have examined same and recommended adopting them, which recommendation was accepted and bids were ordered, same to be opened June 16th.

Following is the report of the street committee: We recommend that the Sixth street sewer be repaired under the supervision of the city surveyor, using concrete or stone for same. Also when repairing bridges that concrete foundations should be used so that when arches are made, foundation will not be lost. We also recommend that the building of the bridge on Manzanita St. be postponed for the present. We also recommend that the marshal see that the ordinance in regard to the obstruction of streets by railroad trains be rigidly enforced.  
Council then adjourned.

## DISCOVERED THE CAVES

**Mr Davidson Tells How He Found Josephine's Wonder.**  
In Oregon, since 1868, and only twice in Portland during that time, is the experience of E. J. Davidson, of the Missouri Flat mining district in Josephine County. The district is 14 miles from Grants Pass, and has long been a placer gold producer.  
In 1868 the Davidson family crossed the plains and settled in Oregon, and now all its members are interested in mining. E. J. Davidson is a brother of I. G. Davidson, of Portland, and the brothers had not met for six years when the former came to Portland yesterday, says the Telegram. He owns the Miners' Creek placer ground, and has been working it for the last five years. He had with him yesterday, a number of coarse nuggets that he had just extracted from the ground. He was the original discoverer of the Josephine County Caves, and gives the following account of how the discovery was made:  
"In the early days the pioneers were obliged to subsist on wild game, the result of their prowess as hunters. We placed gold all over Josephine County during the rainy season, and spent some time in hunting.  
"In the Fall of 1869 I was trailing a bear, near the coast about 40 miles from Grants Pass, and he disappeared in a cave. I followed him in and secured his carcass, thus finding the caves. The caves are the most wonderful in the country and I have traveled at least four miles underground through them. They have not been explored fully, and very few know of their existence."
