The Grants Pass Women's Club held their first meeting in the Presbyterian church parlors, last Saturday afternoon, October 1, 1904. As officers were elected at the close of last year the work was taken up with the new officers in charge.
Mrs. Riddle, Mrs. Wharton and Mrs. Day were taken in as new members, with others to join later.
A letter was received from the Lewis and Clark committee stating that stories from old pioneers would be accepted and sold, the money going toward the Sacajawea Monument fund.
The resignation of the treasurer was read and accepted and Mrs. Seavey elected to fill the vacancy.
A communication was also received from the general club asking that delegates be sent to the general convention, which meets at Baker City in October. The club voted to send the president, Mrs. Ora Hemmenway, with expenses paid, to the general convention, and also appointed Miss Goodin or Mrs. Hildreth as delegate to attend should the president be absent.
A letter of acknowledgement was received from the gentlemen who presented the club with \$35 for the Carnegie Library fund. This money had to be returned on account of the library not materializing.
The calendar committee was requested to report at next meeting in order to map out the year's work.
The report from the different departments was as follows: Music department to meet with Mrs. H. C. Kinney the second Friday of each month; literary department to meet with Mrs. W. M. Hair the third Friday of each month; Home and Household Economics and Hygiene department to meet with Mrs. John Lucas next Thursday afternoon at 3 o'clock, at which time a practical demonstration in cooking will be given; the parliamentary department to meet the first Tuesdays in the month. A great deal of interest was manifested and the indications are that the club will have another successful year's work.
It seems that the benefits of such a club have never been fully appreciated by the ladies of Grants Pass and it seems that everyone who wishes to improve or better themselves should join with the club and especially attend some department.

The funeral was held at his home on Wednesday afternoon and in respect for the deceased, the business houses of the city were closed from 2 to 4 o'clock, p. m., on request by the mayor.

Mr. Rehkopf was a thoroughly honored and esteemed citizen and had been a prominent member of the city council for a number of years, in which capacity he has left a record for faithfulness and capability. He was an honored member of the A. O. U. W. and of the Foresters of America. His age was 53 years. He leaves a wife and daughter.
