AN EQUAL ASSESSMENT

Press Association Proposes Law
For This Object

Albert Tozier, secretary of the Ore-
gon Press Association, reports 242
publications in the state of Oregon, 179
of which are weeklies, 31 monthlies,
23 dailies, 7 semi-weeklies, 1 semi-
monthly and 1 quarterly.

Among the recommendations by the
legislative committee of the Oregon
Press association was that of the
amendment to the tax bill, which was
prepared by the committee during
the special session of the legislative
assembly, which required the assessor
to prepare a list by precincts of the
names and total value of the property
of each person assessed in such pre-
cinct and requiring such list to be
published at least 15 days prior to
the meeting of the board of equaliza-
tion of the respective counties.

The committee believes this law to
be a good one and of great interest
to the public in general, and says:

"This law is drafted after the Illi-
nois law which has practically solved
the problem of attaining a fair and
equal assessment of property. The
Illinois law requires a printed de-
scription of the property and is more
expensive than the one we have
caused to be prepared, which will
therefore be a great economy over
the Illinois law and will cost the
counties but little. The cost, of
course, will depend upon the number
of taxpayers in the county."

Two Flocks of Thoroughbreds
Near Merlin.

F. A. Pierce and L. A. Masters of
Merlin called at the Courier office
Monday. These gentlemen are goat
raisers and each of them have a herd
of high grade Angoras. Mr. Pierce
has been a resident of Merlin for some
time and on his farm which joins the
townsite, he has a flock of 124 goats.
Mr. Masters is a recent arrival from
Cleveland, Douglas county, and lives
about two miles north of Merlin. He
has a flock of 144 goats composed
mostly of pure breed, registered
goats. Mr. Masters is an enthu-
siastic fancy goat breeder and has been
successful in winning many prizes
with his goats. He showed us a num-
ber of samples of Mohair and one in
particular, which was 15 inches in
length and very fine and lustrous.
Mohair of this quality is worth \$2 a
pound, while the common hair brings
about 30 cents.
