EVILS OF EATING ALONE.

The Digestion of a Solitary Diner Is Always at a Disadvantage.

There are some few happily disposed individuals, says the London Lancet, who can dine alone and not eat too fast, nor too much, nor too little. With the majority it is different.

The average man puts his novel or his paper before him and thinks that he will lengthen out the meal with due deliberation by reading a little with, and more between, the courses. He will just employ his mind enough to help, and too little to interfere with indigestion. In fact, he will provide that gentle mental accomplishment which gives to a meal. This is your solitary's excellent idea. In reality he becomes engrossed in what he is reading till, suddenly, finding his food cold, he demolishes it in a few mouthfuls; or else he finds that he is hungry, and paying no attention to the book, which he flings aside, he rushes through his food as fast as possible, to plunge into his arm chair and literature afterward. In either case the lonely man must digest at a disadvantage. For due and easy nutrition, food should be slowly taken and the mind should not be intensely excited during the process.

BUYING RUBIES IN BURMA.

A Transaction Which Is Entered Into with the Greatest Precaution.

The peculiar business methods of oriental merchants are illustrated by the manner of buying rubies in Burma. In the examination of rubies artificial light is not used, the merchants holding that full sunlight alone can bring out the color and brilliancy of the gems. Sales must therefore take place between nine a. m. and three p. m., and the sky must be clear, says the Jewelers' Weekly.

The purchaser, placed near a window, has before him a large copper plate. The sellers come to him one by one, and each empties upon this plate his little bag of rubies. The purchaser proceeds to arrange them for valuation in a number of small heaps. The first division is into three grades, according to size; each of these groups is divided into three piles, according to color, and each of these piles, in turn, is again divided into three groups, according to shape. The bright copper plate has a curious use. The sunlight reflected from it through the stones brings out, with true rubies, a color effect different from that with red spinels and tourmalines, which are thus easily separated.

The buyer and seller then go through a very peculiar method of bargaining by signs, or, rather, grips, in perfect silence. After agreeing upon the fairness of the classification, they join their right hands, covered with a handkerchief or the flap of a garment, and by grips and pressures mutually understood among all these dealers, they make, modify and accept proposals of purchase and sale. The hands are then uncovered and the prices are recorded.

WORTHY OF EMULATION.

New York County's Novel Plan to Improve Its Roads.

Somehow or other Oneida county, N. Y., seems to be brimful of suggestions in regard to road improvement which are of practical everyday use, says the New York Tribune. Not only is she active through her Oneida County League For Good Roads and through her board of supervisors, whose resolutions in regard to local road improvements and state road improvements without doubt the strongest resolutions in the state on these matters, but the highway commissioners of the county are not found wanting in their appreciation of the importance of road improvement. Recently, on notice given, they gathered together at Clinton, the home of Elihu Root, and held the first highway commissioners' convention ever held in the county and possibly ever held in the state.

The temperature was below zero, the roads were blocked, and yet of the twenty-eight highway commissioners four-fifths were present. The meeting was held on the lines of the old-fashioned town meeting. The commissioner of each town reported whether his town was under the labor of the non-stop system, the character of the work done and his plans for the following year, and then came a brand new suggestion. The county of Oneida has 2,329 miles of road, and there are fifty mail carriers, whose routes are twenty miles each, which are traveled every day, and these mail carriers are actually patrolling a thousand miles of the entire county system daily. The highway commissioners appealed to the mail carriers to prepare and send to them daily reports showing where road work was needed and also reports showing that the roads were in good condition. Road work is expensive, and on the condition of the roads depends the value of farm lands, and the idea of asking the aid of Uncle Sam's mail carriers is one that would recommend to highway commissioners and mail carriers and ask why it would not be a good thing to hold a highway commissioners' convention in every county in order to put forward the question of road improvement.

Costly For the Farmers.

Many times it happens that the farmers in the stormy season cannot get to the railroad, and therefore the produce which he would like to market and for which the market is clamoring is cut off by bad roads. Could the farmer at all seasons draw his produce to the nearest shipping point he would use his own time to better advantage because he would do this drawing in dull seasons, and the rolling stock of the railroad would be far more effective, because a steady supply of freight would in a measure do away with the congestion of traffic which happens from time to time and which is a source of great loss to all concerned.

Vagrants Work on Georgia Roads.

Georgia's new vagrancy law makes it lawful to put to work on the highways any adult who cannot show he has regular employment. As a result of the enforcement of this law the highways of that state are being put in the finest condition.

Southern Oregon State Normal.

The Southern Oregon State Normal School began the year's work Wednesday, September 14th, with an attendance unprecedented in numbers and character. It has become the policy of the state to maintain the school, and new buildings with good equipments have sprung up as if by magic, and the large campus covered with shade trees is now alive with busy, ambitious happy young people who have come from various parts of the state, from Washington and from Northern California.

The course of study is so arranged as to qualify teachers for the public schools of the state, but music, literature, elocution, and the languages are taught, and many persons are taking advantage of the opportunities here offered for general culture. The faculty is composed of eleven men and women, who are specialists in their respective lines of work. The dormitory life is wholesome and many of the best students live at the campus in the commodious buildings provided for their home. The expense, including tuition, board and lodging, may be estimated at \$135 to \$150 per year.
