LOCOMOTIVES FOR S. P. CO.

Shasta Division to Receive a Large Number.

In order to keep pace with the steadily growing traffic on the Shasta line, the Shasta Division, director of transportation, has placed an order for 100 locomotives, all to be delivered within 12 months. All but five will be for freight service and be of the heaviest type. The Shasta route will have a large number of these locomotives as the freight business along this line has increased to such an extent that the present equipment is hardly equal to handling the traffic. Both railroad men and shippers of Southern Oregon will appreciate this betterment of the train service of this division, and of the Company's determination to meet the needs of the rapid increase in the freight tonnage of this section.
