WORK OF COUNTY COURT

New Surveyor Appointed—Tax Levy Made.

Liquor license for six months to Burnett & Lee at Leland. License application of A. M. Irwin, of Placer, refused by reason of remonstrance.

Clerk ordered to collect from Mrs. Marianne Sargent \$21, the amount of burial expenses of W. B. Shoemaker.

Resignation of B. O. McCulloch as county surveyor, accepted and H. I. Reynolds appointed surveyor. Bond approved of W. H. Fallin, county assessor.

Road district No. 4 was made to include township 35 south, range 5 west. J. R. Yetter was awarded the contract for a term of three years to board the county poor at \$3.25 per week, the county to supply clothing and medical attendance.

O. O. Lund was given all the timber on the right of way of the road from Grants Pass to the town Lower Applegate bridge in consideration of his removing the timber and brush from said road.

Viewers and surveyor having made an adverse report on a proposed road down Rogue river, petitioned for by T. J. Everett, et al., the road was not granted.

The county assessor was ordered to have the lands in three townships of the county valued and the value of each tract for timber and agricultural purposes ascertained for assessment purposes. The assessor was to employ a competent person to do the work and to report at the next term of county court the cost of valuing and the valuations given the land as compared with former assessments.

The Grand Water & Power Company granted a perpetual franchise to set post and string wires along county roads.

Report of Sheriff Lewis on delinquent tax sale on roll of 1903 approved and clerk ordered to credit sheriff's account with the amount.

For a proposed county road in township 38, range 5 west, petitioned for by W. H. Wimer, et al., J. J. Brown, G. W. Lewis and Jacob Hansen were appointed viewers and H. I. Reynolds, surveyor, to meet on January 26 to view and survey said road and to make a report to the court on January 31.

The county surveyor was ordered to make a survey of the proposed road from Grants Pass to the Hand mines.

A warrant was ordered drawn in favor of H. L. Gilkey, trustee of the Grants Pass fund, for \$1250 for said road fund.

A warrant was ordered drawn in favor of the Grants Consolidated Mines Company for \$100.00 for lumber used on Taylor creek bridge, said company having contributed \$2500 on said bridge and road improvement.

The tax levy on the roll of 1904 was fixed as follows: County 13 1/2 mills, state 4 1/2 mills, school 8 1/2 mills, road 5 mills, county high school 3 1/2 mills.

THE FIRST WIRE HOP YARD

J. W. York's Applegate Hop Yard First Wired in This Section.

J. T. York, one of the big hop raisers of Josephine county and whose yard is on the Applegate at Missouri Flat, was in Grants Pass Thursday, Mr. York has 15 acres to hops, but will not increase his acreage this year, as so many hop men are doing, he thinking it best not to spread out his efforts too much and get more hops than he can give good cultivation to, and carry on his other farm work, he also being engaged in general farming and stock raising. Mr. York has heretofore used poles in his yard for training the vines up, but he has discontinued the poles and is wiring his yard. He found the poles both expensive and unsatisfactory, as they had to be renewed every few years and had to be very large and high, as the rich soil of his land produces such a luxuriant growth of vines that the small poles could not sustain their weight. Mr. York is using No. 10 for the main vines and No. 8 for the cross vines. He will use fir poles, placed 25 feet apart, to string the wires on. When the poles rot off at the ground, he will set short yew posts and wire the upper posts to them. The yew wood will last a great many years in the ground and will sustain the fir upper posts as long as they will withstand the weather. While the wire system is used extensively in the hop yards of the Willamette Valley and California Mr. York's yard will be the first in Rogue River Valley to be equipped with wire. While the first cost is greater for wire than for poles, yet the former is the cheaper in the end as the heavy posts used will last for years and the wire as long as the vines are in bearing. The wires are strung over the field like a great mesh, the crossings of the wire being directly over each hop plant, the vines of which are led to the wires by strings that strung each are spring.
