Undertaking Parlors Completed.
Hall & Cole will next week complete their undertaking establishment in every respect. A cement floor was laid for the ground floor and a partition was put in, dividing the space into two rooms. One will be for a morgue and will be fitted with all the requirements for caring properly for the dead. The other room will be for their hearse, and is a model for the purpose. Horse attachments are arranged that the hearse can readily be washed and cleaned after a trip over a muddy or dusty road. The hearse, which arrived last week from the East, is one of the finest ever brought to Oregon. It cost \$1850 and weighs 1800 pounds. While the interior is plain, yet it is of the very best of the finest and the heaviest and purest plate and the enamel on the wood and steel having the most perfect luster.
