Toppings of Laurel Grove was at Provolt Monday on business. Dr. J. A. Lewman, of Provolt was at Applegate Tuesday on business. He reports the crops fine in that vicinity. A fine bunch of beef cattle were taken from our vicinity to Grants Pass Thursday by Sweetland, of Grants Pass. Leo Hill and son of Grants Pass were at Provolt Friday and purchased a span of horses from K. Fields, for \$300. The team is to be used on the Granite Hill stage line. Louis Leesch, the Provolt hop grower, was at Grants Pass Thursday accompanied by Thos. Lewman, to order hop supplies for the coming season. Dr. D. S. J. Pearce, of Footman's creek, was visiting with friends here this week. Mr. Pearce and his sons operate a placer mine on Footman's creek. He is a pioneer of Southern Oregon.
