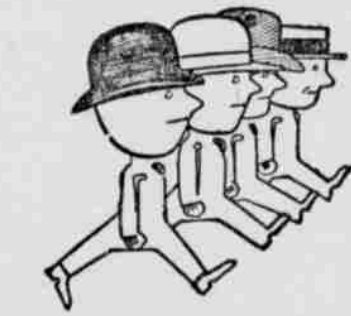

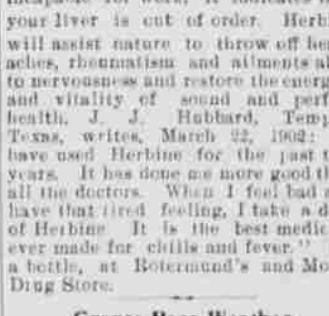
Prosperous Church Organization. The Methodist Episcopal church South of Grants Pass is prospering as are all the other churches of the city.
