

ENCAMPMENT OF OLD SOLDIERS AND SAILORS

At Grants Pass in September—
Big Attendance Expected—
Program of Interest.

The annual reunion of the Southern Oregon Soldiers and Sailors Reunion Association will be held in Grants Pass on September 14, 15, 16, 17 and 18. This will carry the reunion over Sunday and is a new departure, the idea being to enable the children to attend the Saturday exercises, which will be of a patriotic nature for their instruction, and to enable a union religious service to be held Sunday. The program for this day will be in charge of the Grants Pass Ministerial Association. The first day of the encampment, Thursday, will be Grants Pass Day and the Post and the Corps of this city will have charge of the program for the day and evening. Friday will be Medford Day and the Post and Corps of that town will have charge of the exercises for that day. Ashland will have Saturday and Sunday services will be arranged for as stated above, by the ministers of Grants Pass. The Gold Hill and Central Point Posts and Corps will conduct the exercises for Monday. It is expected that the program for each day will be of a high order and the public will be given a cordial welcome to the various exercises that will be held on the camp grounds.

The date of the encampment is earlier than usual which will thus preclude the possibility of cold rains interfering as was the case at Jacksonville last year, when the encampment was held in October. The location of the grounds is in charge of the Grants Pass Post and as yet no selection has been made. The encampments heretofore held in Grants Pass have been in the bicycle grounds or Tufts' grove, but a new location may be secured for this encampment as so many of the trees on the bicycle grounds have been cut that there is but little shade there and the Tufts grove is rather far from the business part of the city. It may be that the Harmon block on North Sixth street will be secured. This tract is not so large as desired but it is conveniently located and has a handsome grove of trees. It is on the lines of both Grants Pass and Condon electric lines and light can readily be had, as also pure water. The tents for the old soldiers and their wives are owned by their Association and they will be shipped here from Medford, where they are stored, and be set up under the supervision of a committee of local G. A. R. men. The town entertaining the encampment supply free of charge the light for the grounds and speakers platform, the water, straw for bedding, fuel and the coffee and soup.

This encampment is held each fall in one of the Rogue River Valley towns, it being in rotation at Ashland, Medford, Jacksonville, Central Point, Gold Hill and Grants Pass. There are usually from 200 to 300 old soldiers and sailors and their wives and other numbers of their families present, and the exercises are attended by large crowds of people from various sections. It is expected to have some of the prominent men of the state present and speak at the various exercises.
