New Road to Granite Hill.

County Surveyor W. I. Reynolds has made a preliminary survey for a county road from the present county road on Louisa creek that leads to Grants Pass, to the Granite Hill mine. There is a private road now up Louisa creek to the mine, but there are a number of heavy grades on it, and the road being a private one the work of keeping it in repair falls largely on the American Golds Fields Company, the owner of the Granite Hill mine. The company now pays roads taxes to keep up other roads, but has to keep up the road to its mine at its own expense. The road being legalized it will be put on a good grade and the company will liberally contribute to aid the county in opening the new road and putting it in good shape to travel on. The road by the new route will be 2 1/2 miles from the Grants Pass road to the Granite Hill mine.

A Fine Hop Yard.

P. B. Burrough was in Grants Pass Tuesday from his farm near Murphy. Mr. Burrough stated that the crop prospects in his locality were of the best. His son, J. B. Burrough in partnership with Linn Jewell, has leased 42 acres of fine Applegate bottom land of C. C. English and planted it all to hops early this spring. Mr. Burrough states that they get a splendid stand and the vines are growing so thickly that experienced hoppers predict that they will have a crop of 400 pounds or more to the acre this year, which is extra good for many new yards produce so little the first year as not to be worth picking. Messrs. Burrough & Jewell have their entire yard under irrigation and that with the rich, loam soil gives such vigor to the vines that their yard will be sure to be one of the largest producers in Oregon. They have their yard wired and in the best of condition.

Run of Fish Light.

Jacob Fry returned last Friday to his home at Illabe, on Lower Rogue river, after spending a couple of days in Grants Pass with his brother-in-law, A. Aubrey. Mr. Fry is fishing near the mouth of Rogue River and he stated that of late very few salmon had entered the river from the sea. Mr. Aubrey and other local fishermen state that for the last two weeks the run of fish has been very light in this section of Rogue River. The run of salmon has been very good most of the time this spring and the fishermen, in addition to supplying the local demand, have shipped a large amount. Most of the shipping of salmon is done by W. H. Magoon, who is here from Oregon City buying fish for a Portland firm, and he ships from 250 pounds to a ton a day.
