A Brief Record of Local Events.

The M. E. church at Albany has passed a resolution to be presented at the conference now in session in that city, asking that their pastor, Rev. J. W. McDougall, be returned for another year.

W. A. Henry, an old time musician who has taught music on this coast for many years, arrived in Grants Pass Wednesday to locate. Mr. Henry makes a specialty of violin and orchestra work.

E. F. Meissner of Kerby has the thanks of the Courier force for a basket of choice grapes. The grapes grown by Mr. Meissner are of superior flavor and are among the best brought to the Grants Pass market.

The recent rains, the first after an exceptionally dry summer, were refreshing and beneficial in many ways, one of the particularly pleasant features being the quenching of the many forest fires throughout Southern Oregon and clearing the atmosphere of smoke. Fires were unusually plentiful this year in the mountain districts. Some valuable timber was destroyed in places where the ground had been burned over for many years but in most cases the fires were really beneficial in clearing out the undergrowth and fallen timber and other debris and preventing a heavy accumulation which would result in the destruction of all the standing timber in case of fire.

RICH ORE AT THE QUEEN OF BRONZE

Ore is Variety Known as Black Oxide, Full of Stringers and Ribbons of Native Copper.

A magnificent strike in copper ore was made recently at the Queen of Bronze mine near Takilma which seems to have eclipsed any similar discovery yet made in the Southern Oregon district. The Queen of Bronze is the individual property of C. L. Tait, who has been at the mine since the fall of the present month and who has been directing prospecting operations in company with Manager George Carter, formerly assayer for the Takilma Smelting Co. The discovery was made in an old tunnel, known as the "old south tunnel" a test of an exposed ore stringer showing a high per cent of copper. An outcrop of 15 feet was made from the tunnel and an enormous body of very high grade ore has been uncovered. The tunnel has a depth of 200 feet and from the chamber made by the upraise the miners have drifted in all directions distances of 40 to 60 feet as yet finding no walls in any direction.

The ore is of the variety known as black oxide and full of stringers and ribbons of native copper, nearly the pure metal. The ore being oxidized no blasting is required and it is taken out with picks at the rate of 75 tons per day. The rock is so rich in copper that it cannot be smelted by itself but the percentage has to be reduced by mixing it with an inferior grade. For this purpose a surface ore running about 10 per cent is used. This surface ore is merely shoveled from the ground into cars and is mixed in the proper ratio in the ore bins with the richer ore.

The ore from the new body "breaks" about 40 per cent, that is the whole body as it is mined out will average that percentage though streaks and stringers of the ore body carry much higher values.

Few people of the county have any idea of the extent of the industry which is being carried on by the Takilma Smelting Co. From July 1 to September 1, two months, the company shipped 29 cars of matte and produced in that time some 30 cars of slag besides quantities of lime rock, the last named commodity being secured in the vicinity of the mine.
