HURT IN SUMPTER MINE
Althouse Man Receives Severe Injuries in Mine.

Mrs. Mary Ellen Leonard returned last week from Portland, where she has been visiting her son, Frank J., who is under the care of Dr. Moore, recovering from an accident received in the shaft of the Menominee mine near Grants, Grant county, Oregon, in September.

Leonard and another miner were being hoisted to the surface from the 200 foot level, both of them riding in the bucket. Just before reaching the top of the shaft, the bucket gave a lurch bringing Leonard directly under a projecting pipe which he struck with his shoulder with terrific force as the bucket was hoisted up. The force of the contact caused the donkey engine to stop for a moment when the engineer quickly noticed and stopped the machinery. The companion cage in the bottom of the shaft, the injured man was taken to Portland and remained at the hospital for some time but is now able to be around although it will be several weeks, perhaps before he is fully recovered. Mr. Leonard left Althouse for the north in July but he had started to work at the Menominee mine only the morning when he was hurt and this was his first trip up the shaft.

PLACER

This promises to be a banner year for placer mining on Upper Gravel creek for every placer mine will be in readiness for full work with the first water from the first rains. All equipment has been put in the best of condition and at some of the mines the plants have been increased to give a larger operating capacity.

Zimmman & Diess operating the Last Chance have their mine ready for work as also the Briggs Bros. operating a fine placer just above the Last Chance. At the Blacklock mine one giant has heretofore been operated, but the second one is being set and will be ready by the time water can be had. Gibson & Wilson have not decided as yet as to whether they will operate their placer or not this winter. There are a number of other placer miners on Gravel creek and all are at work putting their mines in shape for operating for a long run this season.

All the mines on Upper Gravel creek can now only be reached by a trail and all supplies and machinery have to be packed in making transportation expenses very heavy on the miners. The matter is now being considered of changing the trail up Gravel creek from Placer into a good wagon road. There is a practical road up the creek and the grade would be the water level of the creek and the road would be comparatively easy of construction. It would open up a large section that is rich in placer and quartz mines, as well as a large timber district and considerable farming land. The miners and other settlers along the creek are willing to contribute liberally toward the construction of this road, and it is expected that the business men of Placer, Leland and Wolf Creek will assist as they get much trade from this district. The county court will also be expected to contribute toward the construction of this road as the opening will develop a section that will become an important taxpaying district of Josephine county.

PRIMARY LAW MAKES TROUBLE

Time For Filing Nominations Is Past and no Primary Election Can Be Held.

The city charter says Grants Pass shall have a municipal election on Monday, December 4. Under the new primary election law the primary election for this city will have to be held 30 days prior to the regular election which would be on Saturday, November 4. The law also provides that nominations for this primary election shall be by petition and that these petitions shall be filed with the city recorder not less than 15 days before the date of the primary election.

A further requirement is that the recorder shall give 30 days notice of the primary election. This Recorder J. M. Booth, through an oversight, failed to do, so no nominations have been made and none can now be made as the time for filing them expired on October 20th.

The city attorney, the recorder, the mayor and the councilmen have been wrestling with the problem this week since the dilemma was discovered, but no plan of procedure has been agreed on. Some of the local attorneys hold that the courts would hold the election legal if the notices were posted even but a few days before the election and the election held as usual, the common law not depriving the voters of their rights through the negligence of some official. The election law provides that a candidate may be nominated by petition after the primary election and it also provides that a candidate can be voted for whose name is not on the ballot, the law requiring that blank places shall be left on the ballot for that purpose. As the law cannot now be fully conformed to in holding the primary election that could be passed by and candidates nominated by petition for the regular election in December. Under ordinary circumstances the validity of the election would not be questioned, but should a bond issue be made or some similar transaction serious trouble might follow.

At the December election a mayor and five of the eight councilmen will be elected, then councilmen holding over, all the other city officers being appointive. In addition to a successor to Mayor George Good, successors will be elected to Councilman W. M. Blair in the first ward, Councilman T. W. Williams in the second ward, Councilman Will O. Smith and F. W. Chausse in the third ward and Councilman T. Y. Dean in the fourth. A 10 go out by expiration of their terms except Councilman Chausse, who was elected in August by the council to fill the vacancy made by the absence of Councilman Blair in the first ward.

As appointive officers can only hold until the next general election the Third ward will have a two councilmen to elect, one for a two year term and one for a one year term.

None of the outgoing officials have expressed a desire for re-election, but friends of each say that they shall have the nomination if they will accept it. A strong sentiment is favoring the re-election of Mayor Good as an endorsement of the clean, vigorous administration he has given the city. In the First and Second wards a movement is now under way to secure the re-election of Councilman Blair in the first ward.

Fourth ward no announcement has as yet been made in regard to candidates, but no doubt there will be candidates in plenty.

FALLS OFF HER GO-CART

Little Margaret Hemenway Strick on With Paralysis.

The Evening Telegram of the 23d contains the following special from Silverton:

"Margaret, the 9-months-old baby of Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Hemenway, accidentally fell from her go-cart, striking upon her head, and as a result the right side is becoming paralyzed. Mr. Hemenway is manager of the W. A. Hemenway & Co. store. Saturday afternoon at the store a friend came in, and, wishing to take Margaret up in her arms, she fastened the strap that held her. Before the woman could grasp the child, Margaret fell to the floor, and struck her head sharply. Little was thought of it at the time, but yesterday she gradually became worse."

Mr. and Mrs. Hemenway were residents of Grants Pass until a few months ago when they removed to Silverton. They have many friends here who will anxiously await favorable news regarding the child's condition. Little Margaret was a singularly lovable and attractive child and one who when in company was always surrounded by a crowd of admirers and it was the delight of every woman's heart when she was permitted to hold Margaret in her arms for a few moments.

In a letter received Thursday from Mr. Hemenway he said the little girl had now recovered some use of her right hand and in 10 days she will probably be fully recovered.
