### NEW LAW RELATING TO SCHOOL CHILDREN

Must Attend School or Parents Liable to a Fine and Imprisonment.

Below are some of the provisions of the new law regulating the employment of child labor, and for the attendance of children at school.

Section 3. No child under the age of 14 years shall be employed in any form, for wages or other compensation to whosoever payable, during the hours when the public schools of the town, district, or city in which he or she resides are in session.

Section 4. Attendance at school shall be compulsory upon all children between the ages of 8 and 14 years in all cities, town and villages of the State of Oregon during the whole of the school term in the city, town, or village in which the child resides, and upon all children in such city, towns, and villages between the ages of 14 and 16 years who are not employed in some lawful work.

Section 5. No child under 16 years of age shall be employed, permitted, or suffered to work in any employment enumerated in section 2 unless the person or corporation employing him procures and keeps on file and accessible to the school authorities of the district where such child resides, and to the police and board of inspectors of child labor, an age and schooling certificate as hereinbefore prescribed, and keep a complete list of all such children employed therein.

Section 11. Any person or corporation who shall employ a minor contrary to the provisions of this act, or who shall violate any of the provisions thereof, shall be guilty of misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in a sum not less than \$10 nor more than \$25 for the first offense, nor less than \$25 nor more than \$50 for the second offense, and be imprisoned for not less than 10 nor more than 30 days for the third and each succeeding offense.

Section 12. Any parent or guardian who shall violate any of the provisions of this act or allow any child under their custody or control to be employed contrary to the provisions of this act shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not less than \$5.00 and not more than \$25.

Such is now the law of Oregon. We are informed that it will be enforced in Roseburg and several other Oregon towns. There has been in the past too much non attendance of school by some children who should have been in school. Running at large they not only become a menace to the community and candidates for the reform school, but they do great harm by inducing other children to play truant. Supt. Turner says there are none too poor in Grants Pass to send their children to school, as the law provides that books shall be furnished free to those who are unable to buy them and there are ladies societies in town which will see that good clothing is provided for those whose parents cannot properly clothe them.

### A STURDY PIONEER OF APPLIGATE VALLEY

Mr. Rehkopf Hale and Active at 75 Years—Planting More Hops—Exterminate Plum Trees.

Andrew Rehkopf is a striking example of the youthful vigor that many of the Oregon pioneers possess. He is 75 years old yet as active as the average man of 40 or 50. Mr. Rehkopf resides on his fine farm on the Applegate between Provoit and Applegate postoffice, and Thursday desiring to come to Grants Pass to attend to some business matters, and his horses all being needed in the farm work, he started to walk to town. He had made 14 of the 17 miles from his place to Grants Pass before 10 o'clock, when a neighbor with a team, caught up with him and gave him a ride on to town, he arriving here as fresh and vigorous as though out only for a short morning jaunt. Friday morning Mr. Rehkopf started afoot on his trip home, he expecting to make the 17 miles in five hours.

Mr. Rehkopf came to Memphis, Tenn., when he was a young man, from Germany, and in 1853 he went to California, coming to Applegate valley in 1856, where he has since lived. He first settled on Williams creek, buying of Ben Smith the farm now owned by J. M. Johns and on which the village of Williams now stands. He afterwards sold the Williams creek ranch and went in partnership with William Pernoll, now deceased, and bought the farm now owned by Mrs. Pernoll and her sons near Applegate postoffice, and they carried on for several years extensive farm and stock business. In 1870 he sold his interest to Mr. Pernoll and took up his present farm as a homestead. In 1870 he was married to Miss Mary Woodbridge, a daughter of Aphus Woodbridge, an Applegate pioneer.

Mrs. Rehkopf died three years ago, and since then Mr. Rehkopf has made his home with his son, Henry, who is married and resides on the home place and assists in carrying on the farm work. Mr. Rehkopf and his son have 27 acres to hops and had a fine crop this year which they are yet holding for a raise in price. Mr. Rehkopf is not discouraged at all over the hop outlook and will have 15 acres more set to hops next spring. This yard will be put out by John McCallister and son, William. They do all the work and deliver the hops in Grants Pass and get half of the crop for a term of years. Mr. Rehkopf furnishes the land, the wire for one way and the timber for the poles. Mr. McCallister has completed a dwelling house adjoining the hop yard land and he and his son are now erecting a barn. He has rented his farm at New Hope and will shortly move his family to the hop yard. The yard is located on Applegate bottom land, the soil of which is a deep, rich loam and it will produce an extra fine quality of hops. Mr. Rehkopf proposes to profit by the advice given by Prof. Cordley at the farmers institute last September, and cut down all the plum trees on his place. Prof. Cordley stated that it had been clearly proven that the plum and prune trees were the seeding places for the hop louse. The wild plums being their favorite haunt. Were these trees all removed a big work would be accomplished in eradicating the pest that causes such big losses in hop yards, for they will not breed on any other kind of a tree. On Mr. Rehkopf's place there are many wild plums and he will have them all grubbed out as also all on the adjoining land.

Mrs. Heckes has moved here to spend the winter. Mrs. Jennings is having a house built here in which to spend the winter. Mrs. Banfield and Itha Banfield who have been spending a few days in the Pass have returned. The doctor was called last Wednesday for Mr. Boren, who had been suffering from an operation on his hearing. The large air compressor for the mine arrived last Friday. It weighed over 15,000 pounds and was several days on the road between Grants Pass and here.
