The placer mines of this district have started up, though a week later than usual. The indications are that there will be plenty of water for a long mining season.

The Winter term of the Waldo school began on Monday of last week with an enrollment of 21. The school is in charge of Chas. F. Chessman.

A number of our farmers are planning to secure a farmers institute for this place in February, at the time that Dr. Withycombe holds his series of institutes in Rogue River Valley.

There is considerable farming and stock raising now done in the Illinois Valley, but the agricultural resources of the Valley are not as yet one-twentieth developed.

All that is needed to make this valley one of the garden spots of Southern Oregon is to get the settlers we now have to fully realize the agricultural possibilities of our valley and to so demonstrate them in broad meadows and fields, well kept orchards, fine cattle, hogs, horses, sheep and goats and good appearing homes, that we shall attract homeseekers to occupy the thousands of acres that are awaiting their coming.

These farmers institutes will give our farmers new and more progressive methods of farming and teach them the value of producing only the best crops and raising only the best stock, thereby realizing the best prices.
