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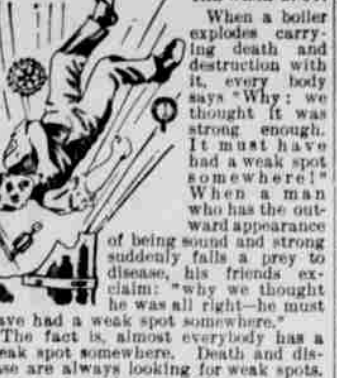
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W. C. T. U. Column

All matter for this column is supplied by the Grants Pass Woman's Christian Temperance Union. The regular meeting of the W. C. T. U. held on Friday afternoon was interesting and well attended. Considerable business was transacted, several articles on the subject of Peace and Arbitration were read and a poem by Ella Wheeler Wilcox "Woman and War" was recited by Miss Howard. Herbert Shattuck, a graduate of Cornell University and a highly talented young man giving himself to the cause of temperance, was present and gave an interesting talk on Loyal Temperance Legion work. Mr. Shattuck spoke to the children in a union meeting at the Methodist Episcopal church on Sunday afternoon. His subject was David and Goliath and the little folks were deeply interested and ready to answer questions and to name some giants in power in our land today. In the evening he addressed a union meeting of the young people in the Presbyterian church. On Monday he visited the school and was granted permission to address the pupils of the eighth grade and of the high school. Sunday was quite a day for the presentation of temperance truths in Grants Pass for besides Mr. Shattuck, Dr. Telfs, president of the Anti-Saloon League for Oregon, and Dr. Van Pelt, state attorney for the same, were here and addressed audiences in the churches morning and evening besides holding a meeting in the afternoon. In the Pacific Christian Advocate of December 13 we find the following concerning Dr. Van Pelt: "The Rev. Dr. Van Pelt, of the Cincinnati Conference, has been selected as the attorney of the Anti-Saloon League of the State of Oregon. Dr. Van Pelt was a lawyer before he became a minister. As a pastor and preacher he attained a desirable record and eminent success in his Conference. He is a man of finest character, pleasing address and very superior ability. He is coming to Oregon to take the place of so efficient a man as Mr. McAllister, and will doubtless give satisfaction to all who are interested in the suppression of the liquor traffic in Oregon and the Northwest. We welcome Dr. Van Pelt and bespeak for him the heartiest co-operation of all our people." Mrs. M. N. Graves who was to have been here and delivered two lectures some time ago, but was detained in Ashland by serious illness, came in on the Monday evening train and stayed until Tuesday evening with the president, Mrs. Calvert. Excursion to California Under Auspices of the Oregon Development League, Leave Portland on Special Train January 15. Secretary Tom Richardson, of the Oregon Development League, is very anxious that the state at large should be well represented on this excursion. The party which will be composed of ladies and gentlemen, leaves Portland at midnight, January 13, 1906, stops being made at Sacramento, San Francisco, Palo Alto, San Jose, Paso Robles, Santa Barbara, and Los Angeles. Special entertainment will be accorded the party at these points. The rate from Portland, will be \$63 for one person, which includes three meals to be served on dinner between Portland and Sacramento, and Pullman berth to Los Angeles. A rate of \$58 will be charged, where two people occupy a double berth. A deposit of \$25 is necessary on each ticket to secure reservation. Section reservation will be held until December 25th. This is an excellent opportunity to visit California, as the auspices under which it is given insures a most enjoyable outing. The excursion is to be run only provided that not less than 125 persons make the trip.
