Mrs. Perkins literally died in the harness, and those who know her believe she would have wished it so. She said "Life is grand and beautiful, and sometimes I wonder if even Heaven will bring me such blessed opportunities for doing good as I now enjoy."

She was a friend and co-worker with Mrs. Eliza J. Thompson called the "Mother of the Crusade," who passed away at her home in Hillsboro, O., on November 3d, after weeks of suffering.

Mrs. Thompson was born August 4, 1816, was married to Judge Thompson in 1837 and passed to the home beyond in 1905, being full 7 years and honors. The subject of her funeral sermon had been chosen by her self and is suggestive to all engaged in work for the Lord.

Dr. W. J. McSorely of Oxford, pastor of the Presbyterian church at Hillsboro at the time of the Crusade gave reminiscences of that great event citing her sympathetic influence over others.
