E. H. Wise has moved to Grants
Pass with his family from Placer and
is occupying a dwelling on Third and
I streets. Mr. Wise was in the mer-
chantile business at Placer, but sold
out recently and as yet has not de-
cided what business he will engage
in.

Ira Gilstrap spent Tuesday in
Grants Pass. Mr. Gilstrap is operat-
ing a placer mine on Miller gulch on
Rogue river, a short distance above
the mouth of Footh creek. He has a
No. 2 giant and good ground, but the

promise of being a big proposition.

equip the mine with a mill.

C. D. Latourette, one of the leading
attorneys of Oregon City, and presi-
dent of the Commercial Bank of that
city, was in Grants Pass Thursday on
legal business on an important min-
ing suit over property in the Green-
back district, he being retained as
counsel with H. B. Hendricks in the
case. This was the first time that
Mr. Latourette had been in Grants
Pass and he complimented its solid,
businesslike appearance and the gen-
eral air of prosperity that was ap-
parent.

John Alverson was in Grants Pass
Saturday and Sunday on a brief visit
with Arthur Ellison, with whom he
was a schoolmate in their boyhood
days in Missouri. Mr. Alverson was
recently discharged from the 60th U.
S. Coast Artillery, in which he had
served for the past three years and he
had with him a medal for marksmanship,
he holding the record as the sec-
ond best shot in the Coast Artillery
service with the big guns. Monday
Mr. Alverson left for Sullivan, Mis-
souri, where he will spend the Winter
with his parents, after which he will
return to Grants Pass, he being so
well pleased with this city that he
will take up his residence here.

Dr. James Withycombe stopped off
in Grants Pass Saturday evening on
his way to his home at Corvallis
from Ashland, where he had spent
the day and at Medford looking after
his political fences, and remained
over night, a guest at the Josephine.
Dr. Withycombe is a candidate for
governor on the republican ticket and
he feels greatly encouraged at the
strong support he is receiving from
the business men and farmers of the
state in this candidacy. While the
rural sections are going to be excep-
tionally strong for the Doctor, yet
Portland and the larger towns of the

state will give him a heavy vote.
Dr. Withycombe received the assur-
ance from many prominent rebap-
tists in both Josephine and Jackson
counties that he would carry Rogue
River Valley by a big plurality at
the primary election in April.

Pioneer Passes Away.

Henry Hiram Sparlin, who died
near Williams, January 21, 1906 was
born near Zanesville, Ohio, October
25, 1833, aged 72 years, 2 months and
28 days. He crossed the plains in
1852 settling in Shasta Valley, Cal.,
remaining there until 1855 thence
returning to Missouri staying there
until 1861 then coming back to Cal-
ifornia and from there he came to
Oregon and settled on the old home
place near Williams, Josephine county.
Soon after settling there he was mar-
ried April 17 same year, to Hanna
Farris, who became the mother of
three children of whom Ira, of Will-
iams, alone survives. He was again
married in 1867 to Rachel Hayes.
To this union nine children were
born, six of whom survive: George,
John, Frank and Harvey Sparlin,
Mrs. Lester Layton, Mrs. Lela
Grimes, all of whom live within a
few miles of the old home and were
present at the funeral. The deceased
has been a prosperous farmer and a
kind hearted man especially to the
poor, he was not a church member
but a friend to the church, contrib-
uting to its support.

The funeral was preached at the
home by Rev. A. J. Starmer, and the
remains laid to rest in the cemetery
on the old home place.

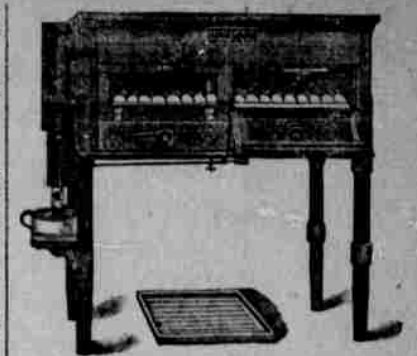
