To Help Boys and Girls.

W. T. Gardner, superintendent and John Tauscher traveling agent of the Boys and Girls Aid Society arrived here Thursday evening and Friday organized an advisory board for Josephine county, whose duty it will be to pass on all applications for children in this county, when presented either by the applicants or referred by the general office; to keep in touch with wards of the Society placed out in family homes within the county, and to see that they are accorded proper treatment by their custodians salaid down by the rules of the society; to report to the general office all cases of abuse or neglect which might come under their notice, to report all cases where parents or guardians subscribe to the delinquency of their children and to give such information to the officers of the society as will make it possible for them to prosecute such parents, under the provision of an act of the legislative assembly approved February 21, 1905, entitled "An act to provide for the punishment of persons responsible for or contributing to the delinquency of children." This is a most important law and if enforced there will be a great decrease in truancy, and delinquency in children, as the officers of the Boys and Girls Aid Society declare that 80 per cent of the delinquency in children can be traced to the fault of the parents.

The new board for Josephine county was organized Thursday afternoon at the residence of Mrs. F. W. Van Dyke and consists of Theodore Cramer, president; Mrs. T. E. Beard, vice-president; H. L. Gilkey, secretary and treasurer; W. M. Hair and Mrs. F. W. Van Dyke. The board will hold monthly meetings.

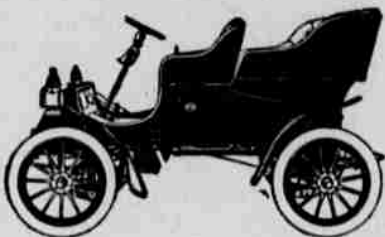
