Teachers Institute at Provolt.

Superintendent Lincoln Savage of Josephine county and Superintendent P. H. Daily of Jackson county have arranged for a joint teachers institute at the Provolt school house on Saturday, May 5. The forenoon session will open promptly at 10 a. m. and the afternoon session at 1:30 p. m. The program will be a very strong one for a local institute. Following the opening exercises Chester Putman, of the Provolt school, will talk on the teachers part. Grammar in 8th grade work will be the topic of Miss Agnew of the Grants Pass schools. Mental Arithmetic will be handled by Victor Dickey of the Missouri Flat school and history will be the topic of the address by J. A. Bish, principal of the Grants Pass East schools. The afternoon program will be opened by an address by Prof. R. R. Turner, city superintendent of Grants Pass, on physiology and the teaching of temperance. The school library will be the topic for Miss Abbie Stites of the Upper Williams school. Miss Myrtle Reushaw of the Laurel Grove school and of Miss Stella Paddock of the Williams school. Prof. M. B. Signa, principal of the Medford school, will deliver an address on methods of teaching language and the program closes by an address by Sept. Daily.

It is expected that there will be a large attendance of teachers and of district officers, patrons of the schools and others interested in the cause of education. Supt. Savage will take a large delegation of Grants Pass teachers in addition to those from other parts of the county and Supt. Daily will bring a large delegation of teachers from Medford, Jacksonville and other places in Jackson county.

A basket dinner will be served and all who come will be expected to contribute eatables. The well known hospitality of the citizens of Applegate and Williams Valleys insure a most bountiful dinner. Provolt is located at the intersection of the two valleys and on the boundary line of Josephine and Jackson counties thus making it very accessible and central to a large section of the two counties.

J. E. Kerley Meets With Accident.

A most deplorable accident occurred last Sunday at 1:30 p. m. in which J. E. Kerley of this city was seriously injured. Just how the accident happened is not known as Mr. Kerley was alone at the time and is not yet able to explain the circumstances, but in some way his foot became entangled in a rope by which he was leading a bull; the animal ran, dragging Mr. Kerley for several hundred yards before he was rescued from his perilous position by Mr. York. He was carried to his home by several men who had rushed to his rescue and Dr. Flanagan summoned. It is thought that no bones are broken although he is terribly bruised all over his body and is suffering intensely and not yet able to move. The worst injury is in the right hip and should this bone prove to be fractured it would be a very serious injury as Mr. Kerley is quite an old man—almost 70 years of age and it is a wonder that he escaped with his life; as it is, several weeks will elapse before he is able to leave his room.

A Brief Record of Local Events.

The Grants Pass Iron Works has just received another lathe, a 16-inch American Engine, from Cincinnati. It is now being installed.

Clifford Schindler, of Woodville, who accidentally shot himself through the hand, last week, is getting along nicely. Dr. Loughridge dressed the wounded member and it is now almost well.

Herman Horning has quite a lengthy addition to his menagerie in the shape of a litter of little grey hounds—four of which are white. While these little animals may not have all the qualities necessary to entitle them to a place in the park, yet what they lack in quality they certainly make up in quantity, as there are 11, all told, in this little family. Herman is thinking of using them as prizes in his box boxes.

Tuesday afternoon Mrs. J. Ferr, of Woodville, drove to Grants Pass from Woodville, bringing her little 7-year old daughter, to consult a physician, she having swallowed a needle three hours before. On reaching this city the child was at once taken to Dr. Loughridge, who found that the needle had passed to the stomach. The little girl was given treatment by Dr. Loughridge, and returned to Woodville that evening, where she is doing nicely and no bad results are anticipated. About two months ago Dr. Loughridge successfully removed a pin from a child's throat, which it had swallowed, and which had lodged in the throat and remained for three days.

Queer things pass through the mails and it requires postal rules to prevent live snakes, explosives, chickens and the like from being sent by Uncle Sam's cheap and efficient transportation service. Two packages passed through the Grants Pass office this week in the registered mail that were out of the ordinary for registered matter. The packages contained fur and were from Harbor, a little post office down in Curry and they arrived here by the Crescent City stage line and addressed to a St. Louis fur dealer. As shown on the tags each package contained an assortment of hides, one having two raccoon, three skunk and nine civet cat skins, and the other had one mink, five grey fox, five ring cat and three martin skins. They probably were the Winter's catch of two farmer boys living in the wilds of Curry county.

E. N. Provolt, one of the directors of the Applegate Valley Telephone Company, was in Grants Pass Wednesday. In regard to the offer of the Pacific States Telephone Company to lease to the Applegate Company the former's line from Grants Pass to Williams for five years and thereby bind the latter company to use Bell telephones for that period with no guarantee of free switching through Grants Pass with other independent telephone lines he was not in favor of accepting it. He would be willing to sign up for one year but not for five as the poles of the line are badly rotted and then a new company might put in a system in Grants Pass and would give free switching to the independent lines and he would want the Applegate Company free to accept the service. For the present he will favor the Applegate Company building a line to Grants Pass and getting connection with an Illinois Valley system and making the best of the situation until a satisfactory arrangement can be made for an exchange in this city.
