To the Voters of Josephine County, Oregon:

Having received the Democratic nomination for County Judge, I submit the following platform of principles by which I shall be governed if elected:

The County Judge in his official capacity should be strictly non-partisan. No special favors should be granted to anyone on account of religious, political, or social affiliations.

Corporations are nothing more nor less than common citizens, and should be treated just as individual citizens are treated. Every man has a right to live and to enjoy the fruits of his labor.

The County Judge by reason of his position can do much to encourage public enterprises. Our great need of railroads, irrigation systems, and manufacturing plants calls for men in public life who recognize the wants of all the people.

The power to levy taxes, equalize assessments, and appropriate public money is one that should be exercised with the greatest of caution. The honor of the county and the welfare of the entire people should be duly considered.

The County Judge should keep himself advised as to the condition of roads and bridges, and see that men who understand the science of road-building are placed in charge of road work throughout the county. No locality should be favored to the neglect of other localities. Every dollar of road money should be made to go as far as possible. Roads should be located with reference to convenience and permanency.

Prudence, justice, and economy should be combined in our treatment of unfortunates.

The liberality of our probate laws would suggest that all unreasonable fees be carefully avoided. Prompt action should be taken in the settlement of estates.

The County Judge as chairman of the District Boundary Board and the County High School Board, can be of great help to other school officials in the advancement of our educational interests. And for this reason he should be well-informed as to modern methods of school work. Our boys and girls should have advantages equal to those of any other county in Oregon.

The County Judge should be a man who has proven himself to be a real friend to the people. He should be a man in whose hands any interest of the people would be perfectly safe.

W. C. T. U. COLUMN.

Miss Brehm, president of Illinois W. C. T. U., says that Sears, Roebuck & Co., of Chicago have petitioned the city council for prohibition in the vicinity of their great new factory. Already half of Cook county, Illinois, is under prohibition. May God and the good people work together till the other half is cleansed.

A dear old friend, in talking of the evils of the liquor business, used to tell how in Ohio years ago, if great mischief was done by a man under the influence of drink, or he himself lost life, the saloon keepers who sold him the liquor were made responsible for damages and not long ago in Chicago the children of John Hedland were granted \$15,600 damages against several saloon keepers. Mr. Carl H. Ross, an attorney, decided to invoke on behalf of the children, an old statute framed in 1874. The act provides that any one whose means of support is injured in consequence of the intoxication of any person shall have action for damages against the one selling or giving the liquor.

A case similar to this was recently tried in Kansas. A law there makes liquor sellers liable for damages resulting from the liquor they sell, but it has never been vigorously appealed to. A woman whose husband had been killed in a drunken brawl sued the dealers who sold the men their liquor and was awarded \$5000 damages. The supreme court of that state upholds the law so she will get her money, as that court was appealed to. If this course were generally followed those engaged in "the trade" would be a little more careful to whom they sold. Those injured in other states in the same way would do well to look up the statutes and where such a ruling has been made they should "Go and do likewise."

Every voter should be careful to vote against those amendments to the Local Option Law which the liquor men are so industriously promoting. Temperance people are not willing to have them pass. Study them well and call your neighbor's attention to them lest the real import be not realized until too late.
