**THREE TICKETS IN THE FIELD SO FAR**

Republican, Democratic and Socialists Have Their Nominations Made.

To get the full returns of the primary election from all the counties has been a slow process and it was not until the first of this week that it was settled as to whom were the republican state nominees. The democrats had but one candidate for each of the positions on their ticket except for a few places so there was no uncertainty as to their nominations. The socialists and prohibitionists, not having cast above 25 per cent of the vote at the last state election, had to make their nominations by conventions or petition as they preferred.

Joe York has secured a contract to enlarge a portion of the Cook & Rexford ditch and is preparing to push work on same to completion.

An error crept into our items when we said Miss Lemon of Williams was visiting Miss Pearl Davidson. It was Miss Bingham of Williams.

J. R. Bailey, supt. of Mountain Lion mine, has moved his family from Williams, Ore., and have taken up residence at the mine; we are pleased to welcome such estimable people into our neighborhood.

J. M. Retallac was not able to attend his law suit in the Grants Pass justice court brought by K. J. Kubli; on account that he is still suffering with a lingering illness from which his recovery is very doubtful.

A very serious accident occurred a little ways up the valley from here, which resulted in killing a horse and seriously injuring Mrs. C. M. Rexford, together with smashing up the buggy. Mrs. Rexford's little girl Flossie is attending the Missouri Flat school and as she has to come quite a distance, her mother usually brings her down in the morning with the horse and buggy; the accident occurred on last Monday morning when Mrs. Rexford was returning home, and while driving over the Slagle creek bridge the horse became frightened at a hole in the bridge floor and backed the buggy off before the lady had time to escape, falling to the bed of the creek a distance of about 20 feet, killing the horse instantly and severely injuring Mrs. Rexford who lay in the water held down by the broken buggy, but by retaining consciousness she managed to keep her head out of the water and called for help. Mrs. Berry who lives near to place of the accident heard her cries and with her husband went to the rescue, but had to summon other assistance before they could get her out and carried to the house on a wagon sheet. Dr. Longbridge was immediately summoned and while he thought no bones were broken yet he could not at that time determine the extent of her internal injuries as she was badly bruised by the fall. We trust however that she will soon recover. This bridge has not been in very good shape for some time and the railing was so rotten that it did not afford any protection whatever in keeping the buggy from going off. Quite a number of the citizens have visited the scene of accident and have expressed the opinion that damage will be required of Jackson county by Mr. Rexford for his loss. The supervisor of the road district appears to have overlooked the fact that his district extends to the Josephine county line, and has neglected to look after the bridges in this part of his district.
