W. C. T. U. COLUMN.

It is often said that it is no use to have a prohibition law because it will be violated. Following that line of reasoning would it not be better to remove all laws from the statute book for some will be sure to break them and then no matter what is done there will be no laws broken? But it is necessary for the protection of society to have laws and to have them enforced and one class of people should comply with them the same as another. No other business shows such utter contempt for and evading of the laws as the liquor traffic. We all know that the liquor laws of our state are being constantly violated. For instance they say that liquor shall not be sold or given to minors or to habitual drunkards. Yet we know they get it some way even when saloon men have been forbidden by the authorities to let them have it. It is against the state law to keep the saloons open on Sunday and still week after week this is done. Who is to blame? Those who have sworn to enforce these same laws and yet have not the moral backbone to keep their oaths of office and back of them the people who elect them knowing they have no regard for those oaths. The voters need to be aroused and to demand that the laws be enforced. Would that this country had more governors like Joseph Folk who has accomplished so much in law enforcement in the cities of Missouri, and that public sentiment were aroused so the people would be determined to sustain those officials who are ready to do their duty, and to see that those who will not do right are succeeded by good men. When our officers do well the good citizens should encourage and help them. Some say that public sentiment would not uphold them if they should attempt a strict enforcement. Folk says: "Public officials do not swear to support public sentiment, they swear to support the law." In a special to the Associated Press last Winter several points are mentioned as having been demonstrated in Kansas City and St. Louis by the enforcement of the Sunday closing section of the dram shop law:

1. The law not only can be enforced but its enforcement is one of the easiest of any law on the statute book.

2. It has actually simplified and made easier the general burdens of the police department.

3. It has resulted in an astonishing decrease in the number of young girls coming in contact with the police department.

4. It has resulted in a marked decrease in the number of saloons.

5. It has resulted in a marked decrease in the demands on public charity.

6. It has been a powerful influence in elevating the moral tone of the city. At the beginning of 1905 Kansas City contained 636 saloons, and affairs were in a serious condition, as they knew no law that hampered their business and defied everybody. Even the judge refused to hear cases against the saloons, and the courts would not inflict punishment. But in March, 1905, the Kansas City Star took up the battle for civic righteousness and in the editorials demanded that the laws against saloons be enforced. Then began Gov. Folk's program of Sunday closing.

The Oregonian speaks to the point when it says: "At Corvallis, Forest Grove and other places where attempts are being made to sell liquor in defiance of law and public opinion, it will be found that such a course only serves to strengthen the anti-saloon forces and increase their determination to win. The local option law is now the law of the state and should be obeyed. The man who openly defies the law is walking the high road that leads to anarchy."

The Pacific Christian Advocate in an article on Civic Righteousness, gives some good advice as follows:

"Let us contend for simple, common everyday honesty and fair treatment of all parties, of all classes, in all places."

"We would exhort that all demand an impartial enforcement of law and a universal recognition of justice, whether the law applies to the poor, degraded creature who makes her living by the outraging of her soul and ruin of her character, or to the man who lives in a mansion, controls millions of money, but dodges his taxes and has others bear burdens which he should carry. Let the people get out a ticket of clean men who will make but two promises: that they will favor the enactment of just laws for the people, and enforce without fear or favor every law applying to conditions over which they have supervision. This is platform enough. If a man is responsible for the enforcement of the law and begins to quibble and explain that he is doing the best he can, he is not the one to have the endorsement of the church or of Christian people. Law can be enforced. If the mayor cannot enforce it, it is his business to call on the governor, and if the state militia is not equal to the task, the president of the United States may be asked to send the regular troops. This whole government is pledged to the enforcement of law and there is no excuse for an officer failing to do his duty. When we begin to enforce the laws we have and live up to the obligations which are upon us, we can then have better laws and of wider range. Let us be Christian in our home circle, in our business relations, in our political life, honoring Christ in everything and everywhere."
