Tickets will be sold to Milwaukee, only on August 7th, 8th and 9th. Limits: Going, 19 days; tickets must be used going on date of sale; final return limit 90 days from date of sale but not beyond October, 31, 1906.

Stopovers: Stopovers will be granted in either direction within the set limits, west of Misouri river, St. Paul, and Minneapolis, and New Orleans, when through that point, except that no stopovers will be permitted in California on going trip.

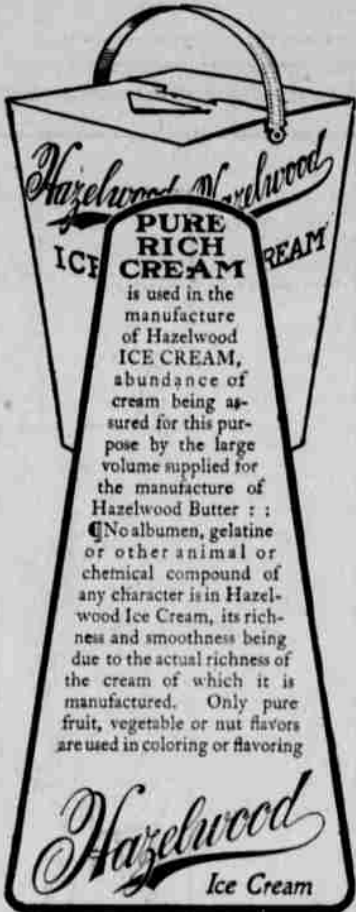

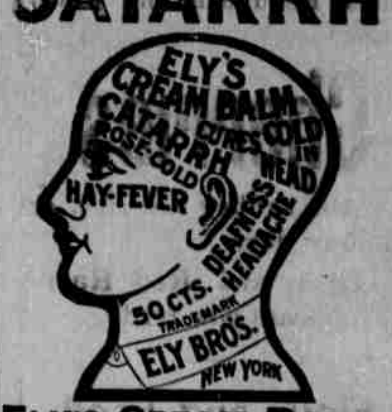
