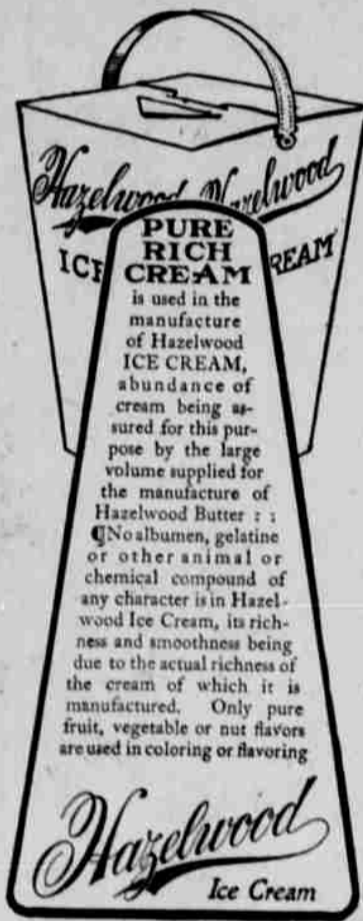
APPLGATE STAGE LINE MAY BE EXTENDED

Manager Herriott Plans to Run His Stage to Applegate Post Office.

Since the change in the schedule of the Grants Pass and Williams stage line the traffic has greatly increased. The stage on Monday's trip brought in 11 passengers, and on nearly every trip the stage is loaded to its full capacity. Manager Ed Herriott is planning to extend his stage line to Applegate postoffice to accommodate the travel from Upper Applegate Valley and Thompson Valley to Grants Pass. There now are five mines in operation in the vicinity of Applegate postoffice besides a large farming community the trade of which largely comes to Grants Pass. To provide this service for Applegate Manager Herriott would change the terminus of his stage line from Williams to Applegate and have the stage leave Applegate for a round trip daily to Grants Pass. To accommodate the Williams Valley traffic he would put on a hack that would leave Williams each morning and connect at Provolt with the stage from Applegate and again in the evening when the stage returns from Grants Pass. If the traffic of the Applegate Valley increases another year as it has this past year Manager Herriott will put on a hack to make daily trips from Davidson and Kubli to Murphy where connection would be made with his stages for Grants Pass. The extension of the stage line up the Applegate Valley from this city will be the means of bringing a large amount of trade to Grants Pass and the business men of this city should support Manager Herriott in his proposed venture. With daily stages from Grants Pass to Applegate and Davidson and Kubli it would be possible to secure a direct mail service from this city to those places, a convenience that would be greatly appreciated by the settlers of those districts and it would also be a very material advantage to the business men of Grants Pass.

CITY COUNCIL TO SECURE A PARK

Has Offer of Fine Tract of Land On Rogue River—Let More Sewer Contracts.

The council met Thursday evening with the following present: Mayor Geo. E. Good, Councilmen Hair, Williams, Randle, Hall, Chausse, Graylin, Dean and Fetech, Attorney Hough, Street Supt. Gilfillan, Marshal McGrew, Treasurer Johnson and Auditor and Police Judge J. M. Booth. W. M. Hair, chairman of the health committee, presented a letter from Robert C. Yenny, State Health Officer, calling attention to the Board of Health Law passed in 1905, which makes it obligatory upon all incorporated cities or towns to appoint a regularly licensed physician as City Health Officer and urging that the matter be called to the attention of the council. Dr. D. P. Love was made the city health officer at \$20 per annum. Mr. Fetech, a member of the Park committee, reported that Dr. Ray has agreed to furnish a five horse power pump and power for irrigating purposes for the proposed city park, free of charge, also that he would furnish lights at the rates they are furnished to the city.
