Tickets will be sold to Milwaukee, only on August 7th, 8th and 9th. Limits: Going, 10 days; tickets must be used going on date of sale; final return limit 90 days from date of sale but not beyond October 31, 1906.

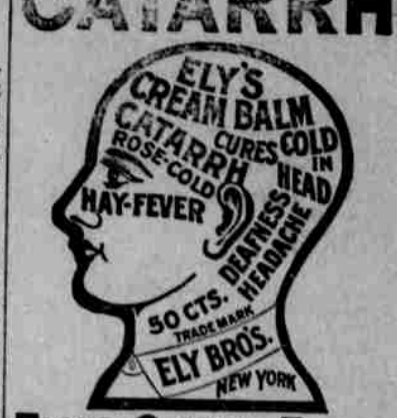
