Convention work was then taken up. Mrs. Addition, Mrs. Honkle, Mrs. Hood and Miss Kittie Loughridge were made voting delegates of the convention.

Mrs. Savage, Mrs. Cowdrey and Mrs. Loughridge were appointed upon Resolutions and Greetings; Mrs. J. M. Chiles reporter to the Courier and Mrs. Hood reporter to Mining Journal. Mrs. Calvert was appointed to assist the secretary. Roll call was responded to by representatives from all unions. Mrs. Hildreth gave a brief verbal report as county president. Mrs. Bower made no report as vice president.

Mrs. Harmon sent written report which was read by secretary. Miss Masie, recording secretary read minutes of executive committee.
