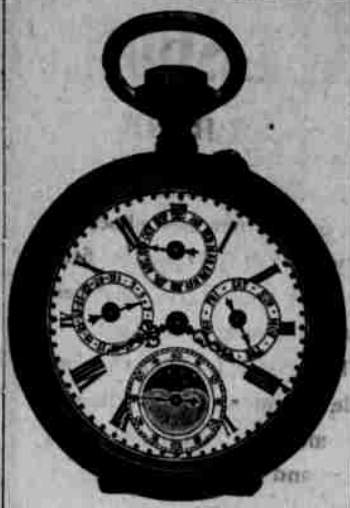

ISLAND SCOUT KILLED

**LIBUT TREADWELL IS KILLED
DURING ATTACK BY BAND
OF PULAJANES.**

Manila, Sept. 12.—Lieutenant R. E. Treadwell of the Philippine Scouts was killed Sunday night by Pulajanes six miles south of Baranen. He was in command of a small detachment of scouts whose bivouac was attacked during the night by a band of about 100 Pulajanes. Lieutenant Treadwell was the only man hit. Troops are in pursuit of the band.

Sixty troops and forty constabulary stuck a band of Pulajanes near Sitio Marabou, killed one and wounded several of them. The rest of the band escaped. The troops sustained no casualties and destroyed a large quantity of supplies gathered by the Pulajanes.

On the parade ground of Grondo, Russia, an unknown man killed Chief of Police Grisodjeff with a revolver, yesterday. The assassin escaped.

The world's homeopathic congress began in Atlantic City, N. J., the scientific discussion of papers on nearly all subjects coming within the jurisdiction of the profession, yesterday.

In Russia children are employed by the terrorists to execute attempts upon government officials, because their movements do not awaken suspicion, and they are not liable to capital punishment.

Secretary Bonaparte has ordered a court-martial of Captain Comly and Lieutenant Pressey, of the Alabama, on charges of neglect of duty in handling the ship when it collided with the Illinois.

Three brothers, named Smith, of Cape Girardeau, Mo., are charged in the United States District Court of holding 42 negroes, four of them women, in practical slavery and made them work on 4,000 acres of reclaimed swamp land.

Mrs. Morris Lewis, aged 36, the wife of a traveling salesman of Philadelphia, was brutally murdered yesterday. Her body with a bullet wound in the throat, was found in a hall closet. The body bore evidence of a struggle. There is no clew to the murderer.

At Bjelazerkov, Russia, yesterday, a band of armed roughs attacked the local branch of the discount bank in full view of many people and got off with \$49,000. One bystander was killed, and one of the robbers, fearing capture, committed suicide.

At the session of the Polar Congress in Brussels yesterday Dr. Jean Charcot announced that he was organizing an expedition to the South Pole, and Charles Bernard, president of the Belgian Icarographic Society, stated that the society was organizing an expedition to the North Pole. The two expeditions will operate simultaneously and in concert.

James L. Colgate, head of the banking firm of James L. Colgate & Company of New York, and a holder of a \$1,500,000 policy in the Mutual Life Insurance Company, has made public a letter supporting the "administration" ticket of the Mutual. Strike Breaker Turns Thief.

SHOTS IN DEFENSE OF MOTHER

**Youth Fatally Wounds Stepfather
Who Attacks Family With Razor**

Eureka, Cal., Sept. 12.—Richard Perry, 19 years old, shot and probably fatally wounded his step-father, whose name is Cavanaugh, at their home at Ferndale today. Perry fired five shots with a revolver, three of which took effect.

Cavanaugh, who is a teamster, has been in the habit, when intoxicated, of beating his wife and children. Last night he came home in that condition and threw the baby toward the ceiling. When his wife interfered he attempted to strike her, and when her son defended her slashed the young man's arm with a razor.

Perry secured a revolver and fired over Cavanaugh's head to frighten him, but when Cavanaugh continued his attack shot him twice in the breast and once in the arm. There is little hope of Cavanaugh's recovery.

Writes Judge to Grant Divorce.

Pueblo, Col., Sept. 12.—Judge John F. Voorhees of the District Court is in possession of a "cross bill" filed in a divorce case by the husband of a woman. The bill is in the shape of a postal card, under the date of Albuquerque, N. M., and signed Oscar Greer. The card reads:

"Dear Judge—I noticed where my wife who used to be, has applied for a divorce. I promised her when I married her she could have anything she wanted, so give her my consent. Let her have it, for God's sake, and don't mention the thanks. I wish I were able to send her a dozen divorces, because that I feel it is a stumbling block removed."

Hartje's Detectives Are Indicted.

Pittsburg, Pa., Sept. 12.—Herman Staub and John Anderson, the two private detectives who figured in the Hartje divorce case and testified for Augustus Hartje that they broke open the trunk of Thomas Madine, the coachman, and one of the co-respondents in the case and in that way procured some of the letters alleged to have been written by Mrs. Hartje, have been indicted by the Grand Jury on the charge of entering a building with intent to commit a felony.

Tonopah Has a \$10,000 Fire.

Tonopah, Nev., Sept. 12.—Fire started in the Turner House here yesterday afternoon, completely destroying the building, which belonged to George Sway. The whole town was threatened, but the fight of the fire department confined the flames to the building and annex. The loss is estimated at \$10,000, with no insurance.

SIX BOYS BURNED TO DEATH.

Are Enticed Away From Home and Taken to Alaskan Fisheries.

San Francisco, Sept. 12.—News has reached this city that Willie Silva, aged 16 years, who was enticed from his San Leandro home by a Chinese boss for the Alaska fisheries, is dead. Six other boys who were Silva's companions on the trip north are also dead, and their bodies lie in unmarked graves on Coffee Creek, Alaska.

Young Silva was missed from his home April 15, and his father was told that he had been kidnapped and was about to be taken to the Alaskan canneries in the ship Santa Clara. The police searched the Santa Clara without avail. It has been since learned that the boy had been hidden on the vessel by Chinese.

On June 2 the cannery where the boys worked was fired, and it is said that when efforts were made to arouse them it was found that they had been stupefied by opium-smoke. The flames made such rapid progress that it was impossible to save them.

SAY CHILDREN WERE DRUNK.

Strange Conditions Are Alleged to Exist in Swiss Canton.

New York, Sept. 12.—A cable from Geneva says: It is the custom in the Canton of Leicub, where liquor is very cheap and large quantities are smuggled across the frontier, to drink before and after every meal. Black coffee and cognac often replace coffee and milk at breakfast, with the result that young children often arrive at school intoxicated. The other day a school inspector, dropping in unexpectedly on a class of some fifty children of both sexes, varying in age from 7 to 14 years old, found more than half of the class completely intoxicated and sleeping, and the other pupils more or less under the influence of liquor.

GOVERNMENT LENIENT

**PRESENT PALMA THINKS HE
IS TOO LENIENT WITH
INSURGENTS.**

Havana, Sept. 12.—Concerning the present attitude of the Government and the decree issued by President Palma, General Rafael Montalvo, Secretary of Public Works, said today:

"The Government has been entirely too lenient with the rebels. Our desire to avoid bloodshed has been mistaken for vacillation. The suspension of constitutional guarantees was necessary to effect the arrest of several Senators and Congressmen who form the central revolution committee in this city and whose actions have been closely watched lately by men of the secret service."

As to rumors that the rebels proposed attacking Havana, General Montalvo said there were but a few small and unimportant bands on the outskirts of the city and no large force near Havana. This city itself was amply protected.

"Aggressive action now will be begun," General Montalvo concluded, "against the rebels in Havana, Santa Clara and Pinar del Rio provinces."

Secretary of the Treasury Sterling denied the report that the Cuban Government had begun in communication with Washington, or has been consulted in any manner. Government officials say the administration is capable of coping with the situation.

Ex-Congressman Dr. Malberty, clerk of the House of Representatives; Felipe Gonzales Sarrals, General de Cades and ex-Mayor of Havana Juan Ramon O'Farrill, who was ousted from his position by Governor Nunez to make room for a moderate successor.

Protection In Cuban Waters.

Washington, Sept. 12.—American shipping and commercial interests at Havana, Cuba, are to have the protection of an American warship in Cuban waters. While Government officials show an inclination not to discuss Cuban affairs in any particular beyond making public dispatches from Minister Sleeper, the American Charge at Havana, confirming dispatches printed in the daily press, there can be no doubt from the attitude of the officials that the cruiser Des Moines, which cleared from Norfolk yesterday, is sailing on a State Department mission, and it is rumored in official circles that she will proceed immediately to Havana.

Boy Says Father Must Go to Jail.

Chicago, Sept. 12.—Assistant State Attorney Crowe left the acquittal or imprisonment of his father to a 7-year-old boy.

Mr. Crowe called the boy, Thomas Connors, in conference as to what course should be taken in the prosecution of James Connors, his father, who had attacked his son with a knife in their home in South Chicago and inflicted a disfiguring wound in the boy's cheek.

"Well, son, what shall we do? It's all up to you."

Young Connors hesitated for some time.

"I guess that he will have to go to prison," said the lad, and dropping on the floor he cried for the plight that awaited his father.

Pump Food Into Prisoners.

Winnipeg, Manitoba, Sept. 12.—Fourteen Doukhobors confined in the Regina jail absolutely refused to eat. The mounted police are compelled to force food through their teeth.

The men, leaders of nude pilgrimages among hundreds of their countrymen, are confined in jail to prevent their organizing fresh marches through public streets, but the humiliation only steel their hearts.

Under the care of a physician each Doukhobor is laid on his back, pinned to the floor, a napkin tied under his chin and liquid nourishment pumped into him.
