DRIVE ENGLISH FROM TRADE

ANTI-FOREIGN FEELING IN CHINA INCLUDES ALL NATIONS BUT JAPAN.

The English Are Said to Be Injurious Affected More Than Any Other Nation.

Washington, Sept. 12.—Mall advices received here from China are disquieting to Americans having financial interests in the Orient. There is no abatement of the anti-foreign feeling and the animosity is no longer confined to Americans, but includes all foreigners except Japanese. A formidable party has arisen and is conducting an active propaganda. It is known as "restorer of rights," and its purpose is to drive the foreigners out of business in China and to that end begins by rendering valueless the foreign investments. In some quarters the Chinese Government is alleged to sympathize with the movement; and, at any rate, capitalists interested in important concessions are complaining that the Chinese officials are deliberately destroying their holdings and violating their agreements at every turn. More than any other nationality the English are said to be injuriously affected by this attitude of the Chinese Government. The movement to destroy or regain control of concessions held by foreigners is said to have begun when the famous Hankow-Canton revolutionary concession was regained by the Chinese Government by purchase from the American concessionaries, and since then every new enterprise in the way of public utilities in China has been offered and manned by Chinese themselves, foreign experience and direction being utilized only to the point where the Chinese were able to acquire the knowledge necessary to operate them. The English are complaining that in violation of an agreement, the Chinese Government is constructing a railroad from Shanghai southward with the deliberate purpose of destroying the value of an English concession and greatly injuring Hongkong, and there are allegations that mining concessions granted to British subjects have been held up and the concessionaries embarrassed.

Some of the great British interests are uniting in strong appeals to their Government to adopt a stronger attitude and protect them in their Chinese enterprises.

CAUSES RUN ON BANK.

A Check, Not Properly Endorsed, Causes Report of Failure.

Chicago, Sept. 12.—Because an Italian who was ignorant of banking methods was refused payment on a check without proper identification yesterday at the Pullman Loan & Savings Bank, he spread the report that the bank was refusing payment to depositors. The result was a run yesterday afternoon, during which several hundred savings deposits were withdrawn. Today the run was resumed, 500 workmen and women being lined up at the doors of the bank when the place was opened for business. So eager was the crowd that a large detachment of police was necessary to restrain it.

All demands for payment were promptly met by the bank, which is one of the strongest institutions of its kind in this section of the country. Its officers declare that any statement of trouble is absolutely without the slightest foundation.

No Hope for Transport Sheridan. San Francisco, Sept. 12.—According to advices received yesterday from Honolulu, all hope of saving the U. S. army transport Sheridan without the wrecking apparatus on the way from San Francisco has been abandoned. Every effort to haul the vessel off the reef at Barbers Point has proved futile. Although the Sheridan is not pounding, there are several breaches in her plates and the water has entered her engine rooms.

The leaks are of such a nature that even should the vessel be hauled from the rocks, it is very doubtful whether she will ever float again. The crew is still on board, but all the cabin passengers and baggage have been sent ashore.

Feeding the Milk Maker

Feed the calf, feed the heifer, feed the bull, feed the cow when in milk, when dry. It is not with any intention to detract from the benefits to be derived from better breeding that so much is said about feeding, but to warn against that too prevalent idea that breed will accomplish all without feeding. It has been our experience that the man who has learned the principles of better feeding, and adopted them, very soon learns how to improve by better breeding and selection. There is no intelligent dairyman who does not know that a very large percentage of the cows in this country are not producing to their fullest capacity and that because of the fact that they are insufficiently fed.—D. Drummond, Ottawa, Canada.

From Green to Dry Food.

How shall the dairy cow be changed from green food to food more dry with the least shrinkage in the milk flow? The answer to this question will be modified specifically by locality, but some things may be said with reference to it that will apply to any locality, according to Professor Shaw, who advises in American Agriculturist: As soon as the pastures begin to fail in quantity, so that the cow must necessarily begin to work for her food unduly, supplemented food must be furnished. As soon as the grasses begin to materially lose their succulence more succulent food should be provided. The former may be furnished as mill feed or in the form of molasses food; the latter will be furnished as molasses food. If the dairyman can furnish both nutrient and succulence in ample supply in the molasses food, then outlay for mill feed is not necessary, and this certainly should be his aim. The molasses food at such a time will be pens and oats, alfalfa or some other molasses food preferably leguminous in character.

Forage Items.

Rye sown Sept. 10 to 15 two bushels to the acre will be ready to feed about May 25.

Wheat sown at the same time and same rate will be ready to feed about June 7.

Redtop at the rate of one-half bushel, timothy one-quarter bushel and clover ten pounds sown in September will furnish feed by June 20.

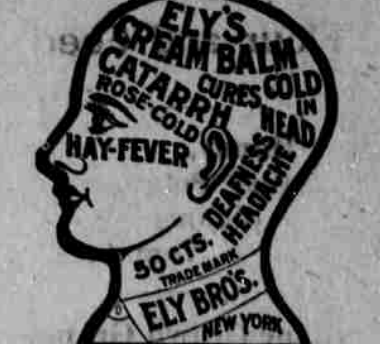
