MINING MEN IN SESSION

GOVERNOR OF CALIFORNIA ADDRESSES MINING CONGRESS IN DENVER.

Denver, Col., Oct. 17.—The American Mining Congress met in annual convention yesterday in the Broadway Theater. Several hundred delegates and many interested auditors were present at the opening session. President J. H. Richards responded to the welcoming address delivered by Governor McDonald and others, after which five-minute speeches were made by a number of prominent delegates and directors, including Governor Pardee of California, and Cutler of Utah.

After the appointment of committees President Richards delivered his annual address. He advocated the establishment of a department of Mines and Mining of the Federal Government and the creation of a new member of the President's Cabinet as its head. President Richards submitted a resolution urging the passage of such a measure by the National Congress.

Another important matter to come before the Mining Congress is a bill recommended by Governor Pardee of California to prevent mining frauds by State legislation.

IN ARMS AGAINST THUGS.

Every Outlet of Nyack Is Guarded to Keep Criminals Out.

New York, Oct. 17.—No one can enter the village of Nyack now after dark without being held up by an armed officer and compelled to explain his business. Every outlet of the town is being guarded in an effort to capture the burglars who have been spreading terror through that and other villages of Rockland county.

In Spring Valley the streets are patrolled nightly by self-appointed vigilance committees. The same condition of affairs prevails in Talmont, Sufferin, Pearl River and Piedmont. Over seventy-five houses have been robbed since last August, and in every instance the burglars escaped.

Moors Are Ready for Holy War.

Paris, Oct. 18.—The imminence of a formidable native rising in Morocco and Algeria is growing. The French military authorities in Algeria are in a state of apprehension. The commander of the troops in the district of Ain-Sefra has cabled to the Minister of War saying that the preparations among the Moors for a holy war are proceeding energetically. Mouly About, a cousin of the Sultan of Morocco, has visited all the tribes and has induced them to cease their internal quarrels and prepare to take the field in the middle of November. A point of concentration has been chosen on the Wady Ghir, where arms are being collected. The Bengull tribe has been approached by emissaries from the insurgents at Tachella, who are urging the former to join in the movement.

ROOSEVELT DECLINES.

President Will Take No Part in State Elections.

San Francisco, Oct. 17.—In reply to a letter written to President Roosevelt by R. C. Dale of Kern county, a former Assemblyman, asking if the President intended to declare his interest or preference in the State gubernatorial campaign, the following letter has been received: "White House, Washington, D. C., Oct. 8.—My Dear Sir: The President has received your letter of the 1st inst. and directs me to express his regret that it is not possible for him to do as you desire. He has been asked to interfere in the local contests in almost every State in the Union, but has declined to do so in each instance. The President is sorry he cannot do as you wish but he is sure you will understand how impossible it would be for him to respond in one case and not in others. Will Indict Accomplice of Thaw.

New York, Oct. 17.—That another person may be indicted with Harry Thaw for the murder of Stanford White was intimated by District Attorney Jerome yesterday. Mr. Jerome indicated that such an indictment might be found during argument before Recorder Coff at the right of the District Attorney to issue further Grand Jury subpoenas in the case.

Great Hoel for Yosemite.
Riverside, Cal., Oct. 17.—Frank A. Miller, the proprietor of the Glenwood Hotel here, returned yesterday from Washington, D. C., where he was successful in securing a concession to build a million dollar hotel in Yosemite Valley. The Southern Pacific, Santa Fe and Salt Lake Railways are all said to be interested in the project.

Raises Bananas By Electricity.
St. Louis, Mo., Oct. 17.—W. K. Bixby has succeeded in growing and ripening bananas in the heart of the city. He has three banana trees, the slips having been sent him from Florida about a year ago. All of them are in a flourishing condition. They are cultured under electric lights.

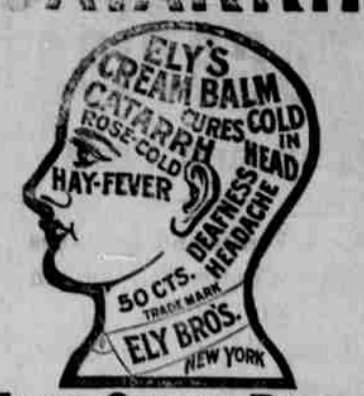
