UNION WAR CENTURED

LABOR LEADER DECLARES WAR AMONG RIVAL UNIONS IN CHICAGO.

Chicago, Oct. 24.—President Samuel Gompers of the American Federation of Labor was asked yesterday by leading Chicago manufacturers to compel local unions to cease fighting among themselves. If this fighting was not stopped, he was told, the "open shop" would be established in the large woodworking factories of the city.

The case was put plainly to Mr. Gompers. He was informed that either the unions must abide by their written contracts and conduct themselves peaceably, or else a great lock-out, which may involve as many as 6,000 or 7,000 skilled factory workers, will follow.

After receiving the committee Mr. Gompers admitted they were in the right and declared that union strife must stop at once.

The labor leader left for Lafayette, Ind., where he promised to confer with President Hubert of the International Brotherhood of Carpenters, one of the organizations involved in the controversy.

The committee which waited on President Gompers consisted of President B. E. Bensinger of the Brunswick-Balke-Collender Company, Oscar Bauer of the Liquid Carbonic Company and J. H. Hanley of A. H. Revell & Co. All are members of the Wood Working Manufacturers' Association, which comprises practically all the large factories in Chicago.

Pure Food Law Endorsed.

New York, Oct. 24.—The rules and regulations to govern the enforcement of the pure food law seem to give general satisfaction. This is certainly the case if views expressed yesterday after a superficial reading by various representatives of branches of business affected are true indications.

Confectionery interests are perhaps the most disappointed, as the regulations fail to give information for which they have been waiting, namely, what coloring matter they may legally use.

President Hoops and other officials of the National Confectioners' Association said the commission will be asked to shed more light on their real meaning.

Socialists to Die for Plot.

Warsaw, Oct. 24.—Fourteen members of the Socialists' fighting organization who were arrested October 20 have been condemned to death by drumhead court-martial. It is expected that the action of the court will result in a general strike tomorrow.

The military authorities continue their domiciliary visits in the residential districts. They recently searched the house of Count Krastinsky, the most prominent of the Polish Nationalists.

Girl Drives Auto From San Jose.

San Jose, Cal., Oct. 24.—Miss Alville Thurston drove a two-cylinder automobile from San Jose to San Francisco yesterday in the good time of two hours and five minutes.

OPPOSE WHITE SLAVE TRADE.

United States to Have Delegates at Congress Held in Paris.

Paris, Oct. 24.—President Roosevelt has cabled to American Ambassador McCormick designating Secretary Vignaud of the American Embassy to represent the United States at the congress for the suppression of the "white slave trade," which opened here yesterday. The primary object of the congress is to secure the effective co-operation of the various national committees, especially for the protection of immigrant women at the ports and also uniformity in legislation providing for the punishment of traffickers in "white slaves."

Building New Town for Steel Trust.

New York, Oct. 24.—Today Elliott H. Gary, chairman of the board of directors of the United States Steel Corporation, and George W. Perkins of the legislative committee, leave for a visit to the new city of Gary.

A good deal of work has already been accomplished at the place in the way of grading and digging slips and canals, but no large construction work has yet been accomplished. Several thousand men are now employed on the property.

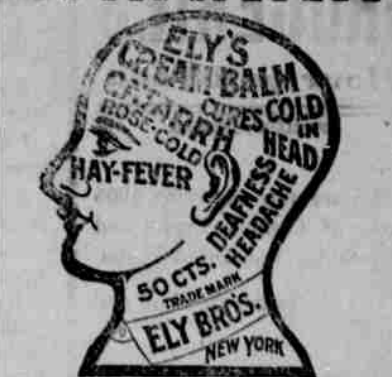
