A FIGHT FOR MILLIONS

SON OF JOSEPH H. GLIDE AC-CUSES MOTHER OF USING UNDUE INFLUENCE.

Sacramento, Cal., Nov. 14.—A contest of the will of Joseph H. Glide, a millionaire rancher and sheep raiser, was begun in the Superior Court yesterday by J. H. Glide Jr., a son. Thornton Glide, another son, is said to favor the action taken, although he does not figure in the suit.

Glide Sr. died about two weeks ago, leaving his property, worth \$1,000,000, to his widow, and reserving only \$5 cash legacies for his children. It was said at the time that he had previously deeded parts of his estate to his children, but it would appear that such was not the case.

The suit is brought by J. H. Glide Jr. against his mother, and sensational allegations are made. He declares that his father was of unsound mind when he made his will, and had become a religious fanatic. It is alleged that months ago Mrs. Glide became associated with the Peniel Mission, and that her husband then protested against their giving money to what he denounced as "religious fakers."

In the course of time, it is set forth, the wife won the husband over, and he made handsome provision for the Mission out of his estate. It is averred that while her husband was weak in body and mind Mrs. Glide poisoned his mind against his children by telling him they were spendthrifts and had no love for him.

The son charges that his mother promised Glide Sr. that she would distribute the property to the children if he left her all of the estate and that she has since refused to do so. The Glide holdings are extensive in Sacramento and Yolo counties.

DELMAS RETAINED BY THAW.

Prominent California Attorney to Plead for Young Millionaire. New York, Nov. 14.—D. M. Delmas of San Francisco has been retained to defend Harry K. Thaw, indicted for the murder of Stanford White, the architect.

Delmas entered into final arrangements as to his retainer yesterday and immediately he consulted with Thaw in the Tombs. Thaw's defense will be justification and the enforcement of the "unwritten law." Delmas will be counsel in the Thaw case in every particular. He has just been admitted to practice in the State of New York, on motion of former Judge Augustus J. Van Wyck.

Regardless of what may be the outcome of the trial, Delmas will abandon his residence in California and continue the practice of his profession in New York.

The California lawyer will dominate the trial, and with the full consent and understanding of Clifford W. Hartbridge, the attorney of record and personal counsel of Thaw. As to the retaining fee, the estimate by Eastern lawyers who know the Western lawyer's ability, places it not far short of \$100,000.

Resting Place for McKinley's Body Windsor, Vt., Nov. 14.—A contract has just been closed with a local granite firm for furnishing the material for the sarcophagi in which the bodies of the late President William McKinley and Mrs. McKinley will rest in the mausoleum at Canton, Ohio. Green granite quarried from Asecutney mountain will be the material used.

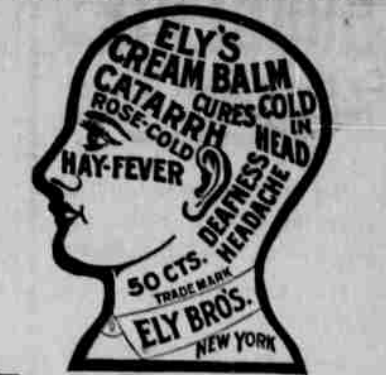
