Moth Can Be Destroyed.

At a meeting of the Clackamas County Horticultural society held a few days ago, W. W. Jesse of Barlow, one of the best known men in Clackamas county, made a statement which should bring comfort to Hon. E. L. Smith, recent president of the Oregon State Board of Horticulture. Mr. Jesse's statement was that about a year ago he heard Hood River Smith say in a public meeting that he could go into an apple orchard infested with codlin moths and spray regularly every other row of apples and in the fall although there might not be a fourth of the apples on unsprayed trees which were not eaten by worms, more than three fourths of the apples grown on the sprayed rows would be free from worms. Mr. Jesse had been raising apples many years but he had never tried to fight the codlin moth by spraying.

It had not seemed worth while for him to spray when he knew that all around him there would be infested trees which would not be sprayed. Impressed by what Mr. Smith said he gave his apples regular spraying with arsenate of lead this year and harvested a crop of which over 80 per cent are free from worms. Mr. Jesse gives Mr. Smith full credit and is doing his best to convince other apple growers of Clackamas county that fighting the codlin moth by spraying is a practical success if it is done as it should be.—Rural Northwest.
