MINERAL RESOURCES OF SOUTHERN OREGON

**Thomas Buckman Tells in Valley
Record of His Trip to
Copper District.**

"The mineral resources of Southwestern Oregon and Northwestern California are but little known by the world at large. Though mining has been done in these parts for the past 40 or 50 years, the mining was done for placer gold and some very rich pockets were struck in those early days. But the real mineral wealth of that part of the country has hardly been touched as yet. The wealth lies hidden in the rocks, in the way of copper, gold and other minerals.

"For an outing I went up a branch of the Illinois river to look at some copper prospects reported in the mountains up there. I got into what may well be classed as mountains, though their altitude is not as great as those farther back from the coast, and they are not as rough and difficult to get over as I have seen in many other places.

"In going in I stopped and made some investigation of the mineral deposits around Takilma, the place where they have a small smelter started. They have worked this smelter at intervals for three years; but as everything has to be hauled on wagons for 40 miles, the coke they use in the furnace, and the matte they get as a product, it takes much profit off; but it has demonstrated the fact of the wealth of the ore.

"Upon going on into the mountains to the croppings I had been told about found they corresponded exactly with those around Takilma, showing that they were an extension of the same vein of ore, and to appearance more extensive than around Takilma. It is supposed that the two districts connect without a doubt, but the mountains lay in such a shape that the croppings of the main ledge does not show out to any extent.

"This district known as the Preston Peak, Crown Point, Saenger mines and the Ivanpah group of claims all lay in Del Norte county, California, and are from six to 12 miles south of the Oregon line, and properly in the west end of the Siskiyou mountains and near where they join on to the Coast range.

The main portion of these prospects are over on the slope towards the Klamath river.

"What is known as the Preston Peak mine has been prospected to the greatest depth, and the ore taken out shows to good advantage, and proves beyond doubt the value of the entire field, and from what I saw while I was there I am convinced that the material is there all right enough, in quantity enough to last for generations.

"For the proper development of these mines a railroad is needed from Grants Pass to Crescent City. It would pass near by the Takilma district, and would run within 10 miles of the one in California. There are no great engineering difficulties to overcome in building the road; and there is plenty of power for electricity when needed.

"It is plain to be seen there is no poor man's undertaking about this. One hundred miles of railroad to be built; though 90 miles would find lots of other business besides hauling mining supplies as quite a portion of the way it would run through a good agricultural country. The building of the road, and putting up the buildings, and installing the proper machinery for reducing the ores, you can see that it will run into big figures, but I am convinced that the material is there to justify the outlay.

"Ninety miles of the road could be classed as a road for general purposes, and I believe it would pay a fair interest in time aside from the mining interest; but the development of the mines is entirely dependent upon the road being built. But when we consider the fact that almost the entire length of the road would be through a rich mining district the amount of traffic the mines would furnish for the road would make this road one of the best paying roads in the country in a very short time.

"Were these prospects out in the deserts of Arizona, or up in Alaska or some other out of the way place there would be a great rush for them, and capital would come in unlimited quantity; but the trouble is they are too close to civilization. But their day will come some of these times, and fortunes will be picked up by some lucky fellows or I am mistaken."

An Historic House.

A recent issue of the Pacific Christian Advocate in illustration of an article by Rev. T. E. Royal, contained a picture of the old Wheeler house two miles north of town, presenting it as the picture of the Patterson house

where the first church was organized in Southern Oregon in 1854. This is only partially an error. The house is not the original Patterson house, but occupies nearly the same location. The Wheeler house, which is one of the oldest of the old houses in this country and is in ruins, is in reality the third house built on this place. This fact is impressive as showing how long ago was the original settlement of this country.

The Patterson house was located just across the road from the future location of the Wheeler home and was burned during the Indian war. Until recent years its location could be easily identified by a small mound of stones, the ruins of the chimney. The Patterson house was one of a considerable number of houses built prior to the Indian war and whose location and even existence have passed from the memory of all but a very few even of the pioneers. The organization of this church was attended by one person who is now a resident of Grants Pass, Mrs. Margaret Tuffa.
