The storm played havoe with telegrabp wires. The Southern Pacific Company had no communication Tuesday further than Blue Canyon, in the Sierra Nevada Mountain and Dunsmuir, on the north. The poor telegraph service made the handling of trains extremely difficult. Up to a late hour no damage along the line was reported at the local office, although in several places trees had blown across the track and delayed trains.


