GRANTS PASS TO HAVE A GLEE CLUB

Organization Will be Composed of Fifty or More Musical Men.
 The Grants Pass Glee Club is a new musical organization formed on Wednesday night with a membership of 32. The call for the meeting was sent out by Harry L. Andrews in response to the often expressed desire for the formation of such a club in Grants Pass. The vocalists met in the Mining exhibit rooms and the meeting was called to order by Mr. Andrews. Discussion being invited, brief speeches in favor of organization were made by T. P. Cramer, R. L. Coe, A. E. Voorhies and H. C. Kinney. Mr. Kinney was elected chairman and E. S. Van Dyke secretary of the meeting. The following officers were elected:

It is aimed to make the organization a Grant Pass Glee club in fact as well as in name. Ranzau Place Sold.

The John Ranzau farm, one of the best in Rogue River Valley has been sold by Mr. and Mrs. Ranzau to T. B. Cornell and Dr. W. H. Flanagan for \$25,000. There are 320 acres in the place, 186 acres of which is fine Rogue river bottom land. Of the bottom land 100 acres is to hops and 80 acres to alfalfa and other crops, the hill land is in timber. Dr. Flanagan and Mr. Cornell bought the farm as an investment that promised a good profit. The hop yard with its complete equipment of dryers, warehouses and cottages for pickers will be continued, but most of the other land will be set to fruit trees within the next year or two, the bottom being the best of apple and pear land while the hill land is well adapted to peaches and grapes. Nine Reynolds has been given the position of superintendent of the farm and with his family he moved last week from his small farm below town to the Ranzau place.
 Mr. and Mrs. Ranzau have not fully decided on their plans for the future but may go to Willamette Valley and go into hop raising on a more extensive scale. They have not yet sold their crop of last year, amounting to 120,000 pounds, as they believe that a raise will come within a month to the present price of 13 cents a pound.
