FREE TELEPHONING TO APPLGATE VALLEY

Applegate Valley Telephone Company to Have Their System Working Next Week

There was an attendance of about 60 farmers and stockmen at Provoit last Monday to attend the meeting of the Applegate Valley Telephone Company and to meet M. J. Anderson, supervisor of the Siskiyou and Ashland forest reserves, who had accompanied Charles Meserve from Grants Pass on the latter's invitation that he might meet the stockmen and millmen explain to them the regulations under which stock may be grazed on the forest reserves and timber may be removed. On the meeting being called to order by President Badger, of the Telephone Company, Mr. Anderson was invited to explain in full the object of the government in creating the forest reserves and to state the rules governing the grazing of stock and the removal of timber from the reserves. Owing to the general misunderstanding that the people of the West have of the forest reserve service of the government there was a feeling manifested by some present that the creation of a forest reserve in this county was a detriment to the stock and lumber industries. Mr. Anderson completely allayed this feeling by his clear statement of the object of the forest reserves and of the liberal terms and the co-operation that the government would give stockmen and lumbermen. The rules governing grazing on the reserves are that 25c per head per season be paid for cattle and horses, but settlers in or near reserves may graze not to exceed six head of milk cows and work horses on a reserve free of charge. Timber will be sold at a stumpage based on the current price of lumber, the quality of the timber and the distance from market. Every stockman present took out a permit and Mr. Anderson left a supply of blanks with C. O. Biglow for others who may apply later. An application was made for timber by Knox & Angel who are erecting a sawmill near Provoit and near the border of the Siskiyou reserve. The business of the Applegate Valley Telephone Company being taken up officers for the ensuing year were elected as follows: C. O. Biglow, president; E. Badger, vice president; W. S. Bailey, secretary; John W. Pernoll, treasurer. The nine directors chosen were C. O. Biglow and Bert Sargent, Williams, E. Badger, E. N. Provoit and Fred Knox, Provoit, William York, Missouri Flat, J. W. Gilmore, Murphy, C. C. English, South Grants Pass, Charles Meserve, Grants Pass. President Badger reported that the loan had been signed by the officers of both companies for the transfer of the 20 miles of line from Grants Pass to Williams by the Pacific States Telephone Company to the Applegate Valley Telephone Company.

John W. Pernoll, who is superintending construction work, reported that the extension lines were strung up Williams Valley from Williams and from Provoit to Applegate and Provoit to Missouri Flat. So soon as the telephones arrived they would be installed. Owing to the heavy expense of installing the system and the few farmers taking telephones, there being but 25 signed for, it was decided to ask the business men of Grants Pass to each take a share and hold it until the business could be induced to put in phones and take up these shares of stock. As a committee to secure members among the farmers and to secure the co-operation of the business men of Grants Pass, President Badger appointed Charles Meserve, Fred Knox and W. S. Bailey. Thursday afternoon this committee began their canvass of Grants Pass and so willing were the business men to aid in giving the Applegate Valley free telephone connection with the system in this city that in but two and a half hours time 23 shares of stock were sold. The committee will complete the canvass next week when it is expected to bring the list up to 75 shares taken in this city. A. T. Marshall, manager for Josephine county for the Pacific States Telephone Company, has notified Mr. Meserve that the telephones for the Applegate Company were shipped Thursday from Portland. It is expected to have them installed the central station established at Provoit by the middle of next week and then the free switching will be established between Grants Pass and Applegate Valley. A central station will be established at Murphy so soon as enough subscribers can be secured which is expected to be had within the next month, when lines will be extended down the Applegate Valley and through the section between the Valley and Grants Pass.
