## A Brief Record of Local Events.

The Masonic lodge at Kerby is to build a two story concrete temple 30x80 feet and are now receiving bids of the construction of the edifice.

As we go to press the news comes over the wire that the jury in the now world famous Thaw murder trial has failed to agree. This will necessitate a rehearing at great expense to the state of New York but to considerable profit to attorneys and the big dailies.

A freight wreck at Dillard early Wednesday morning in which four freight cars were derailed, caused the delay of passenger trains No. 11 and 13, the train due here at 10:30 Tuesday night not arriving until 2 in the afternoon Wednesday. The north-bound passengers are still running from two to four hours late.

Adjutant and Mrs. Story write Captain Eubanks of the Salvation Army that they will be in Grants Pass Tuesday and Wednesday, May 7 and 8 in the interest of the Young People's work. Mr. Story has been in Grants Pass a number of times and always has an enthusiastic audience. He has recently been promoted from Ensign to Adjutant.

G. W. Clement who started his apprenticeship at Grants Pass five years ago, recently successfully passed the mechanical and physical examination for promotion from fireman to engineer at Dunsmuir. Mr. Clement has for the past three years been a resident of Dunsmuir. He is a son of Mrs. A. M. Rule of Woodville and son-in-law of A. N. Halbert, of Gold Hill, and has many friends in this place.

James Dickey, well known here died at the St. Frances Hospital in San Francisco, from injuries received in the train wreck at Sims about three weeks ago. Mr. Dickey was a resident of Grants Pass some seven years ago when he was bringing out of this place in the service of the S. P. Co., Fireman Ed Olmsted, was killed in the same wreck, his body was recovered from the river a week after the accident, and the remains were interred at Sacramento, where his mother lived.

JOHN—At the family home at Williams, this county, on Wednesday, April 10, 1907, David John, aged 72 years, six months, 26 days.

The funeral services were held Wednesday with the interment in the family lot in the Williams cemetery, with a large attendance of neighbors and friends from a distance, who came to pay their respects to the memory of a man whom they all respected. Mr. John had been an invalid for some months through a complication of heart and stomach troubles. He leaves a wife and five children to mourn the loss of a kind husband and loving father. The children are W. D. John, J. M. John and Mrs. Gertrude Herriot of Williams, Mrs. Nellie Dale, of Goldfield, Nevada, Mrs. Stella Stratton, of Oakland, Cal. Mr. John was born in Wales and came to America in 1859 and to this county in 1863 settling at the flourishing mining camp of Williamsburg on Williams creek. The camp soon after was abandoned by most of the miners and Mr. John bought a tract of land two miles above and moved to it and made of it one of the finest farms in that fertile valley. He had received the appointment of postmaster for Williams and on moving to his farm he opened a store and changed the postoffice to it, and for the 48 years since he has kept the office and store.
