**VOTE TO PURCHASE ROAD MACHINERY**

The Question Will Be Decided For or Against Next Monday.

A special election will be held on Monday, May 6, to decide on the purchase of road making machinery and this election will in a measure decide whether Grants Pass property owners want the city to be progressive and up-to-date and show to the world that we wish to make the city a better place to live in or whether we are to be a back number and satisfied with any old road.

The polls will be open from 9 a. m. to 7 p. m. with the exception of one hour from 1 to 2 p. m., when the polls will be closed.

There is a misunderstanding among some of the property owners as to the assessing of expenses for street work and to make those points plain the city council at its meeting Thursday night decided that in the event a rock crusher and roller is purchased by the city for the improvement of the streets, all the dirt work be done as heretofore and paid for out of the general fund and that all gravel work and macadamizing be charged to the abutting property owners, of the property benefitted.

Let us have road machinery and then use it.

**Base Ball Season Opens.**

The first baseball game of the season in Grants Pass will be played on the A. A. C. grounds next Sunday, May 5th in which the Medford and A. A. C. teams will cross bats. Both teams are in good shape and each is confident of success. A good many changes will be made in both teams from the line-up of last year. The Pernoll battery will work with Grants Pass again this year and are stronger than ever and the fans may anticipate some brilliant work from them in this, the opening game. Medford has a new pitcher this year in whom they are building considerable hopes. He, like the American Athletic Club pitcher is left-handed and is expected to do some good work for his team. The game is called for 2:30 sharp.

The A. A. C. teams won and held the championship of Southern Oregon last year and feel themselves competent to defend that title this year, although great efforts will be made by the other Southern Oregon teams to wrest the title from them. A great deal of enthusiasm is being shown in Grants Pass and the crowd which attends the opening will, no doubt, be a large one.
