FRUIT GROWERS TO HOLD EXPERIENCE MEETING

Will Discuss Care of Orchards
and Will Incorporate
Union.

A meeting is called for Saturday,
May 18 in Grants Pass of the Grants
Pass Fruit Growers Union and all
others who are interested in fruit
growing. Forenoon and afternoon
sessions will be held, discussions will
be had on spraying, thinning, culti-
vation and irrigation of orchards.
The growers themselves will conduct
these discussions for there will be no
speakers from abroad present and it
will be in the nature of a school of
experience in which the orchardists
will give their successes and failures
for each others benefit. It is such
meetings as this that has put Hood
River to the front as having the most
thorough and successful fruit raisers
of any section in the United States.
It is the plan of the Union to hold
these public meetings once in two
months hereafter and to consider such
phases of the fruit industry as are
the most important for the season of
the year. The fall program for this
meeting will be published in the
papers later.

At this meeting on the 18th the ques-
tion will be considered of incorporat-
ing the Grants Pass Fruit Growers
Union and of building or renting a
warehouse. The election of officers
for the ensuing year will be held and
a number of important matters will be
up for consideration. As fruit grow-
ing is to be one of the leading and
most profitable industries of Josephine
county it is expected that all who are
interested in this industry will be
present and assist in making the
meeting a grand success.

The Stencil Piano Fraud.

Dear Sir:

Replying to your favor of the 13th
inst., will say that we have hereto-
fore appointed you sole agent in
Southern Oregon and wish to men-
tion the fact once more that you
are the only dealer in the south-
ern part of Oregon, that is entitled
to sell the "S. W. Miller" pianos
manufactured by the S. W. Miller
Piano Co. of Sheboygan, Wis. Any
other piano turned out or manu-
factured or stenciled with a similar
name is a rank stencil and is not the
genuine "S. W. Miller" piano. In
order to protect the buying public
from frauds of this kind, we wish to
say that all genuine "S. W. Miller"
pianos are manufactured at Shebo-
yan, Wis. and have the name "S. W.
Miller, Cabinet Grand, Chicago and
Sheboygan" on the fall board and also
have the name "S. W. Miller Piano
Co." cast in the cast iron plate. Any
other piano with a similar name ex-
cepting the Henry F. Miller piano
manufactured at Boston, Mass., are
rank stencils, and if we can trace
their origin, we will certainly bring
suit against all such manufacturers
and dealers. The genuine "S. W.
Miller" piano is strictly high grade
and cannot be sold for a low price,
as there is no better piano manu-
factured in the world.

We attach to this letter a caution
slip printed a year ago, when we had
similar trouble with some manu-
facturers making stencil S. W. Miller
piano and stenciling it Chicago.
These parties were promptly dealt
with and had a good suit on their
hands to settle, which they have done
and we have not been bothered with
these people but now it appears that
some other concern is making a simi-

lar stencil piano and stenciling it
New York. It will be a very easy
matter for us to find out the origin of
any stencil "S. W. Miller" piano
and we will deal with them very
harshly, as we will appeal this matter
to the Manufacturers Association and
are sure that we can find out the
offender.

As far as any other dealer is con-
cerned, who states that he can sell a
"S. W. Miller" piano \$50 less than
you can, will say that it is absolutely
false, as no one in Southern Oregon
can buy an "S. W. Miller" piano
from us, while you are our sole repre-
sentative.
